Board Approves Supply Budget

Principal's operating budget was approved by the North Halton District High School Board at their meeting Monday in Georgetown.

Members from the five northern municipalities reviewed supply budgets submitted by the Acton, Milton and Georgetown principals. Budgets of \$200 for Georgetown, \$270 for Acton, and \$300 for Milton were approved. Capital equipment in addition to these budgets was also reviewed. Among the purchases approved was a portable record player, amplifier for French dictation for the Acton school.

Trustee Melvin Roberts reported on the opening of a school site in Milton at \$1,000 an acre. Members discussed the procedure on purchasing land and the notification to the participating municipalities.

A representative of Hunt and Lohrke outlined the need for a new floor scrubbing machine at the Acton High School and the advantages of using his firm's maintenance plan and supplies. The plan called for waxing three times a year with a consequent reduction in supplies. It was noted that the budget committee was instructed to investigate the offer.

Trustee Niven reported on the heating system in the Milton High School. He recommended a study of previous contracts on the system since it appeared to be a "kicker-pot" system. He pointed out that members were present from Acton, Nassarawaga, Esquesing, Milton and Georgetown.

Village Post Office Moves

After 46 years of continuous business in the same private home in Campbellville, the village post office was moved to a new location across the street on Saturday afternoon and opened Monday for its next term of business in sparklingly enlarged quarters.

The new post office location meant another innovation for Campbellville bookholders as 72 new letter-boxes are available for village residents to rent and pickup their daily mail without bothering the postmaster. Five large letter-boxes were moved over from the Garrett home to the new office part of the Acton Electric Building where shiny walls, a new counter and writing table look as if picking up the daily mail will be more of a pleasure for the village people.

J. K. Mahon, postmaster for the past 16 years and his assistant Miss Rita Hubbard will dispense the mail for approximately 425 families in the village and rural routes from their new home. There are now approximately 60 Campbellville bookholders, 130 on RR 1, 120 on RR 2, and 115 on RR 3.

The history of the post office at the tiny village is somewhat hazy through its early years, but Mrs. Fred Garrett, who was postmaster's assistant for 40 years there, clearly remembers the Campbellville post office's locations and its postmasters during her lifetime.
