Acton C. of C. Hear Guest Speaker Outline Purpose of Organization

Eric Freeman, assistant manager of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, from Toronto, was present to address the Acton Chamber members at their regular dinner meeting held in the Dominion Hotel on Wednesday.
