### 78th Annual Report Indicates Expansion

Widespread Canadian ownership of the company's stock and the record payment to employees of salaries and wages totaling nearly \$147,000,000 are revealed in the 78th annual report of The Bell Telephone Company of Canada issued this week.

Shareholders increased during the year by 10,000 to 1,628,225. Ninety-eight per cent are resident in Canada and they own 92 per cent of the stock. Employees and pensioners shareholders now number 13,300.

The 41,362 men and women employees of the Bell company received during the year \$146,992,240 in wages and salaries. At year end the company employed 24,345 women and 17,017 men.

During 1935 there was a net increase of 25,721 telephones in service in the Bell's Ontario-Quebec territory. This brought the year-end total to 2,954,634.

This expansion was reflected in Acton by the addition of 69 telephones. C. S. Keith, Bell manager for this region said.

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
