The commission decided to dispense with the regular \$10 service charge for thawing out services at 115 Elizabeth Drive, 54 Mulberry Place, 123 Wynford Place and 55 Madeline Road.

An amount amounting to \$200 for commission expenses to the convention in Toronto was approved.
