Stretch 401 East, West Over Halton's 25 Highway

Road developments on highway 25, Highway 401 and the Queen Elizabeth as indicated in projects in the Dept. of Highways capital program for 1958-59 will extend Highway 401 both east and west of No. 25 Highway north of Milton.

Development of the 401 highway, presently underway between Highway 25 and Highway 10, will continue and the development will be extended between Highway 25 West to Highway 6.

Pave No. 25

The planned paving of Highway 25 between Palomino and Milton will link with an interchange at the Q.E. Highway and the Bronte spotlights.

Included in the carryover work on 401 for a distance of 12.7 miles between Highway 10 and Highway 25. Structures on that length of road include one built just north of Milton on the C.N.R. as well as those at the C.P.R., three miles West of Highway 10 and at concessions 5 and 6 in Trafalgar Township.

Many Structures

Under the new work for Highway 401 West of 25 is grading and culverts for 12.6 miles to Highway 6 as well as a number of structures in the same power of road.

The total Ontario Highways capital program calls for an expenditure of \$148,875,000 during the fiscal year compared with \$122,000,000 in the present fiscal year.

Commenting on the work on No. 401, the report submitted by the Hon. James N. Allan, Minister of Highways notes that "We propose to continue the accelerated program for the highway in order to bring relief to critical sections of Highways 2, 5, 7 and the Queen Elizabeth Way.

Want New Name For Shaw Street

OAKVILLE A more suitable name for Shaw Street is wanted. The Oakville - Trafalgar - Bronte Planning Board received a letter from J. S. Forsyth, 1133 Shaw St., requesting, on behalf of himself and other residents of the street, that the name be changed.

"All of us have various small reasons for desiring the present name," wrote Mr. Forsyth, "and we have in common one thing, a firm belief that we as residents could pick a much more imaginative and fitting name to endow the street on which we live. We feel that the one that exists in no way reflects anything close to what we think is one of the most attractive streets of our community."

The secretary was instructed to write Mr. Forsyth, requesting him to submit suggestions for a new name for the street. Names must start with a letter from S to Y, inclusive.
