Canned Whale Meat Tried as Mink Food

Vancouver, (CP) — Canned whale meat may reduce production costs for British Columbia's \$1,000,000 animal mink industry.

D. J. Wood, director of the University of British Columbia animal depot, says the canning process could eliminate costly spoilage losses resulting from present use of fresh or frozen feed.

In Washington state recently 7,000 mink died overnight from botulism caused by spoilage, he said.

"Mink are expensive to raise because they are meat-eaters. The animals are fed wet feed which may include whale meat, fish, liver, poultry by-products and animal fats."

"Mink diets read like a hospital chart. The animals must be fed balanced diets because the quality of the pelts can be influenced through nutrition."

Wood will know the result of his experiment in November and December when minks are pelleted for the market.

"If our pelt bring good prices and marketing the canned meat is feasible, we may be able to can next year's whale catch."

Discuss Rates Hear Reports At P.U.C. Meet

A complaint was submitted from a consumer who thought his water bill was too high. The commission agreed to leave the bill as it was until another meter reading had been obtained.

Superintendent J. Lambert informed the commission he had installed a temporary water service into the H. K. Porter Industrial site to accommodate the mason workers.

He also pointed out the company had supplied 600 feet of plastic pipe for the job.

Sewage superintendent A. Dobie told the commission he had encountered two newer stoppages but the use of Sanifar had cleared the main.

J. McGrath, secretary-treasurer informed members the engineer had recommended that no more Bradford sewage be allowed to enter the disposal plant after March 31.

Following a discussion on the matter, the commission decided to forward the recommendation to Bradford and Company.

A report from the Action Legion Minor Sports Committee to turn on the colored street lights during the three-day Civic Holiday celebration was approved.

The commission agreed to investigate the possibility of installing water and sewer services in the Women's Institute lot at the park at the same time as the school was installed in the new proposed bath house.

Commissioner R. Everell said he thought it sounded like a sensible move to install the four-lane structure and give the consumers using the power the benefit of some of the surplus.

Subsidy Suggested

Mr. Armstrong suggested the public utilities commission consider having their own subsidization as a means of investment and supplying power at a cheaper rate to the consumer.

Decision on the four-lane rate structure and purchase of a substation was left for further consideration.

The commission approved a 1958 budget of \$22,000 for capital expenditures for the H.P.C.

Hears Reports

A letter was received from the Action Chamber of Commerce concerning the P.U.C. for the encouragement received in installing the colored lights on the streets at Christmas time.
