Acton Teams Meet Defeat in Game Bid

Full of grim determination but lacking in scoring action, three Acton minor hockey teams went down to sad defeats on Saturday at the hands of Milton, Georgetown and Orangeville entries at the big four-town hockey tournament held in Milton arena. The luckless Acton crews lost their games 8-0, 7-0 and 5-1, with Dennis Gibbons of the bantam entry notching the only marker for the three Acton games.

Milton's pee wees took the championship after dropping Acton 8-0 in the preliminary and edging Georgetown 2-1 in overtime for the final in the junior bantam section. Orangeville went home with league honors after squeezing past Milton 3-2 in the morning game and edging Georgetown 2-1 in the afternoon clincher. Orangeville was also presented with the bantam trophy, as they knocked Acton's entry 5-1 in the preliminary and then severely drubbed Milton 9-0 in the final.

Reeve Bill Wilson of Acton was among the municipal leaders from the four municipalities who handed out crests and trophies at the conclusion of the eight hour program, which included nine keenly-contested games.

In the first encounter of the day, Milton pounced on an under-age Acton crew for an easy 8-0 win as Dick Marshall and Craig Bush pumped in hot tricks and Kenny Desjardine and Gary Wickens added angleas for the Milton cause.

The Acton line-up included goalie Steve Goy, Ricky Henderson, Ted Chenevill, Philp Harze, Edie Massey, Kevin Hall, P. Drysdale, Henry Hickamp, Glen Holmes, Frank Motion and Jan Riddell.

In the day's second event, Acton's luckless junior bantams dropped a 7-0 game at the hands of a powerful Georgetown crew. For the winners, Wayne Terry scored three and Jack Gudgoun and Paul Hale scored a pair each. Acton line-ups included Clifford Wedge, Edward Hubbell, Gary Massey, John Creighton, Jim Bulbough, Danny Arbie, Johnny Goy, David Shannon, George Robinson, Bill Cooke, Ruddy Holmes, Mike Pryzlacz and Paul Phelan.

Milton whipped Georgetown bantams 6-4 in the next game as Melvin Fletcher led the Milton attack with five goals and an assist in the sixth. In the next encounter, Georgetown's pee wee entry knocked Orangeville out of the league with a 3-1 defeat. Then Orangeville's junior bantams threw Milton's entry out with a 3-2 overtime win.

Next encounter was Acton's last, as Orangeville skated the locals in to the ice with a 5-1 trouncing that saw the only Acton goal scored. Dennis Gibbons notched the Acton tally at 8:00 of the third period from Inmate T. Waterhouse, but by this time, the Orangeville visitors had their big lead underway and the powerless Actonites failed to click.

Acton line-up included J. Leatherland in goal, R. Swackhamer, F. Dawkins, H. Mellon, D. Gibbons, P. Marks, T. Waterhouse, B. Dede's, R. Malena, K. Ranney, B. McCrall and G. Rosell.

In the afternoon finale, the Milton pee wees took Georgetown for the league championship, then Orangeville beat Georgetown junior bantams and Milton bantams for those two honors.

Top single player in scoring for the day was Melvin Fletcher of Milton's bantams, who scored five and assisted on one in the morning game against Georgetown.

Request New Legislature To Assess Gravel Pits

A resolution to request the Ontario Minister of Highways to consider providing legislation to permit municipalities to levy a fee on a tonnage or yardage basis against gravel pits, etc., was approved by Esqueuing council when they met in the Stewarttown Hall on Monday, March 3.

The above action followed a lengthy discussion by council members on how to assist their road budget by assessing gravel pits, stone quarries, clay or shale pits and stone crushing plants, situated on land bearing a low assessment.

The reeve and clerk were empowered to sign an agreement with R. Paneroy with regard to his building.

The treasurer was instructed to pay the road accounts amounting to \$427.64.
