"Ridiculous" Won't Hire \$10,000 Engineer

GEORGETOWN A proposal by C. H. Sykes and Harrison to advertise for a \$10,000 resident engineer for the town, found no supporters when it came to a vote at council.

In making the motion, Mr. Sykes said he was in no way criticizing W. H. Carr, who has served the town on a part-time basis since the former engineer, Douglas Wilson, left last summer. He feels, however, that Georgetown needs a full-time man in the position who could keep a close eye on government subsidies and take full advantage of them, provide such important things as a plan of the water and sewerage systems and look after roads and other important works projects.

"Asking Too Much" "We are asking too much of our town foreman to do engineering work, and road chairman Gray is certainly doing a lot of work he shouldn't have to do," said Mr. Sykes, pointing out that an engineer would also be a salesman for the town.

A \$10,000 salary would ensure an experienced man and not one just out of college who wants to gain experience, or an older man who wants a retirement job, said Mr. Harrison, who said the town has no assurance that Mr. Carr's business will allow him to continue in the position indefinitely.

Councillor Hyde expressed strong opposition to the plan, as he did at a previous council meeting when it was discussed. He termed a \$10,000 salary "ridiculous" for a town this size.

Finalize Plans For Swim Pool

BURLINGTON Preliminary plans for the proposed year-round Burlington swimming pool are expected to be finalized within two weeks, reported Burlington recreation director Earl Davis recently.

A special committee of four was formed to study the architect's plans and the general set-up of the pool. The committee consists of Mr. and Mrs. Brent Coleman, Gerald Reed and Earl Davis and they will meet with the architect, W. W. Allen, as soon as the plans are finalized. The price of the proposed pool will be considered.

Last year the Ontario Municipal Board withheld approval of the \$150,000 debt-free by-law for the pool, in view of the annexation. However, an expenditure of \$5,000 for preliminary work was granted after representatives of council and recreation commission visited the chairman of the O.M.B. in Toronto and stressed the need for a year-round pool in the Burlington district.

Investigate Rates Of Township Taxes

TRAFALGAR Following an assertion by Councillor E. G. Bulmer that there is no fixed rates for tax rates within the township "you're charged whatever the driver wants to charge" Trafalgar council moved to request Oakville, Bronte and Milton taxi-cab firms to submit statements of their rates to customers.

Councillor Bulmer declared that tax use then meters for rides in and out of Oakville, but for customers going between points strictly within the township, a flat rate is charged. "I don't think people should be penalized just because the taxis happen to operate out of Oakville," he stressed. "There is no fixed rate in the township."

He asked that a meeting be held with the taxi companies but Councillor Martin Critcher interjected that the firms would probably be able to prove that they used fixed rates for township rides by mailing statements to council.

Turn Down Additional Housing Request at Georgetown Council

GEORGETOWN Council in a 6-3 vote, turned down a Delrex Development request for release of additional land for erection of 500 houses, contrary to the agreement made in 1954 when the company came to town. Action had been pending on several occasions but this was the first time it had reached the voting stage.

The rejection was not so much as the wording of the motion would presume a majority of members in their discussion, hinted that council would consider some cash settlement for the town releasing more land without compensating industrial or commercial assessment, although there were differences of opinion on whether council should make a definite offer to the company or wait for Delrex to make an offer for council to consider. Some councillors expressed opposition to construction of semi-detached houses which the company plans to build in the released area.

Fire Calls Down

TRAFALGAR — The number of calls answered by the Township Fire Brigade No. 2 decreased to 38 last year from 44 in 1956, according to the brigade's annual report. Fire losses reported by the brigade were \$29,892 in 1957 compared with \$31,137 a year earlier.

Council approved the following annual remuneration for officers of the Trafalgar Fire Department: fire chief, \$375; deputy fire chief, \$500; district deputy chief, \$150; plus time spent at fires; area secretary, \$100 and brigade secretary, \$25.
