Final Vote is 80.43% A 27-vote majority for Halton Liberal candidate Ken Dick was registered in the armed forces vote, the results of which were announced this week by Halton retuurning officer Alex Cooke of Milton. The servicemen polled 161 votes for the defeated candidate against 134 for Conservative winner Sandy Bost, and 10 for CCF. standard bearer Jack Henry.

The vote of Halton's servicemen was similar to those across the country which gave the Liberals another stat in the Federal house. However, it was not a big enough majority to warrant any change in Halton's Ottawa representative.

Mr. Cooke announced Tuesday that all ballots had been checked and showed a slight difference between tast week's election results handed in by the various deputy returning officers. A grand total of 34,560 voters cast ballots in the election out of 43,487 on the list, making it an \$0 43 vote.
