G.V. Barbeau, Acton C. of C. President Comments on Association's Purpose

The Chamber of Commerce consists of the following answers given by the president:

The Canadian Chamber of Commerce is the national voluntary federation of more than 250 Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce in all ten provinces, the Yukon and North West Territories.

To promote the civic, commercial, industrial and agricultural progress of the community and district.

To help Boards and Chambers function actively and efficiently.

To provide business and community with a strong voice at Ottawa.

To promote freedom and to promote vigorously the viewpoint of the Chamber movement to the federal government.

To promote Canada's system of freedom of enterprise.

To improve Canada's trading position.

To maintain fair relations between labour management and capital.

To stimulate and preserve a strong national unity.

The president also pointed out a real live "real" Chamber of Commerce is also the concern and will of the community.

Mr. Barbeau emphasized the importance of Chamber Week from April 13 to 19. It is being held to get people better acquainted with the C. of C. and what it means and what it stands for.






