minuty of good men with one vital purpose.

The sum of what the speaker said was strikingly illustrated in the travel films of Japan and Burma. In these, Mrs. Tippett alternated with her husband in giving the group a running commentary on the pictures, which were of a very high calibre.

It was interesting to note how the children and the families of the Orient resembled, in particular details, those of the West. The girls and boys could well have been Canadian. The home life essentially paralleled that of the west in a general aspect. They resemble in that "the good life" is basic moral law, and service to fellow man is the highest privilege and ideal in any faith.

Mr. Tippett closed his address with the admonishment to all Y.M.C.A. members not to pass-by around at being Christians. He urged members to value the good things in their lives and not take them for granted.

Conservation Authority For Twelve Mile Creek

A conservation authority covering the entire length and tributaries of the Twelve Mile Creek through seven municipalities was approved Thursday of last week in a brief meeting at Taftville Hall.

Brenton, Burlington, East Flamborough, Nassagawaya, West Flamborough, Taftville and West Flamborough, Nassagawaya, representatives polled eight votes in favor of the establishment of an authority, after A. B. Barnes, assistant director of the Department of Planning and Development explained the authority's work. The only dissenting vote was cast by James McGaig, Puslinch township representative.

Nine Representatives

Representing the feuding municipalities were Reeve T. Millward of Brenton, Eric Geddes and councillor Roy Pennington of Burlington, Reeve W. A. Wingerd of East Flamborough, A. McPherson of West Flamborough, deputy reeve Fred Newell and councillor Joseph Willmett of Taftville, and councillor Arthur Parfitt of Nassagawaya.

To raise \$100,000 for the Authority, the rate will be distributed taking into consideration population of the municipality and the percentage of land inside the authority. For instance, Nassagawaya has 35 square miles inside the new area and a population of 832. The townships share will be \$7.02 of every \$100 which is spent.
