


**DISTRICT NEWS****New Town Trouble****Not Satisfied With County Vote Power**

**Asks Abolition Of \$10 Poll Tax**

OAKVILLE--Councillor Dean Wilkes will move for the abolition of the \$10 poll tax now imposed on citizens who are not property owners or tenants to be announced at a meeting of the town council.

My contention is that people who pay taxes should have a voice, said Councillor Wilkes. Payment of the poll tax does not now entitle a person to vote at municipal elections.

Many people are able to avoid paying the poll tax, said the councillor. The only people who pay are the honest ones.

Councillor Wilkes comments followed the discussion of a report from the town manager on a communication from the Minister of Municipal Affairs on a proposal to extend the municipal franchise to all persons over 21 years of age who have lived in the municipality for 12 months. The town manager advised that if council wished to make this concession a by-law should be given two readings and submitted to the electors at the next general election.

People would be permitted to vote on some matters but not on money by-laws, explained Town Manager Kenneth Needham.

Major change in the new rate structure is to be set at \$2.00 fee on permits for buildings or alterations up to \$200 in value for which there has been no charge up to the present. Up to \$200, \$2.00; \$200 to \$1,000, \$10; \$1,000 to \$3,000, \$15.00; over \$3,000, \$25.00.

Previous rates were: \$5 up to \$1,000; \$10 up to \$3,000 and \$15 over \$3,000.

**Maximum is \$25 Adopt Permit Scale**

GEORGETOWN--A new scale of building permit fees is being adopted with rates varying up to a \$25 maximum in place of the present \$10.

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**Need \$64,000 Yet For Oakville Pool**

OAKVILLE--The future looks much brighter but the Oakville Lions Club needs an additional \$64,000 before the initial construction of the proposed \$100,000 community swimming pool can begin.

The Club pointed out that a delegation headed by Stanley Hall, MPP, and Mayor William Anderson has succeeded in obtaining a \$10,000 grant under the Community Centres Act. It also pointed out that the Club has already contributed \$17,000. Club members have contributed an additional \$1,000 and individual donations so far total \$60,000.

With a total of \$36,000 now things look much brighter than they did but the Lions admit that they still have a long way to go before raising even 75 per cent of the cost and the \$100,000 total is \$64,000 away.


