

### Council Approves . . .

pointed out he suggested to council that since the budget was passed, it became law and if the parks board had demanded the one mill grant, it would have shown a deficit budget and the parks board would be responsible for it.

Councillor J. Hurst informed his colleague that council was willing to accept a \$1,700 deficit and Mr. Barbeau added, "Yes, but not one mill grant." and Reeve W. Wilson told him "We created it" meaning council.

Mayor Cook remarked, "To me this is a storm in a teacup. The amount of publicity you have deemed fit to put on this thing is not worth it."

At this point Reeve Wilson, also chairman of the finance committee of council, reviewed the financial figures presented by the Board of Parks Management for the new building in the park.

In conclusion he remarked, "I feel that the finance committee, and myself personally, were made responsible. It should be brought to the public that the parks board came up with an additional \$2,000 we did not have to deal with when we arrived at the budget."

Mr. Barbeau informed the finance chairman the difference had come up between a council meeting and the following parks board meeting. He pointed out the additional cost had been caused by a change in plans in laying the services to the new building.

Deputy Reeve J. Grey, a silent bystander to this point, remarked "The point to be clarified is that the press did not report correctly and Mr. Barbeau emphasized 'I disagree the parks board agreed unanimously with all that was in the report'."

Councillor Hurst read a prepared statement which follows:

"I take exception as a councillor and member of the finance committee to the statement of the Parks Board that the finance committee of council through improper guidance and contrary to R.S.O. chapter 314 section 17, article 2 presented for acceptance a budget which contained an illegal reduction in the park board rate. This section of the Act was read on Saturday March 19 at the finance committee meeting and all members were fully aware that the parks board could request up to 1 mill to cover cost of operation for the year."

"So there was no improper guidance involved."

"In their submission to council the finance committee in an effort to retain the 62 mill rate included a recommendation that council request the parks board accept a reduction from 1 mill to \$1,000."

"Councillor Barbeau, as representative of the parks board, was fully informed of these facts at the council meeting of April 21, and it is recorded in council minutes that he when assured that council would send representation from the finance committee to a special parks board meeting to submit the request for a reduction, voted in favour of the by-law which set the mill rate."

"Based on the parks board budget figures as submitted by Councillor Barbeau at this meeting the reduction of \$1,000 would have resulted in a deficit to the parks board of only \$500."

"Further to this at the special parks board meeting held on Wednesday April 23 both representatives from council were very emphatic and their emphasis was acknowledged by the press. This council was requesting the parks board to reduce their application from 1 mill to \$1,000 and this council was not setting the rate at \$1,000. This special parks board meeting voted unanimously to accept the recommendation of council."

"Having my conclusions on these facts I contend that there has been no illegal or improper action by council or by the finance committee and suggest that this communication as received from the parks board be filed."

Mr. Wilson asked Councillor Barbeau what prompted the parks board to change their mind's about accepting the reduced recommendation from the finance committee and was told the board appeared in the minority and there was nothing they could do.

Mr. Barbeau informed members they had not asked for an increase, the grant was still one mill, and added, "If we don't receive a grant and have to show a deficit, we are responsible for it and would have to shoulder it."
