There's little doubt that Stan Leonard of Vancouver and Al Baiding of Toronto currently are Canada's two best professional golfers. They've proved that by performance both at home and on the tough U.S. tournament trail.

The 45-year-old Leonard is a six-time Canadian PGA champion and recently scored the biggest single tournament victory by a Canadian in winning the rich Tournament of Champions at Las Vegas, Nevada.

He won the Canadian PGA twice and was the eighth leading money winner on the U.S. PGA circuit last year with earnings of more than \$30,000.

At last count, Leonard had won \$18,565 already this year and had earned about \$2,000.

Although both men have competed against each other several times in the same tournaments, they've never met in a main-tournament battle.

That will come next month when they play five-match series in British Columbia for the unofficial match play championship of Canada. Each match carries \$1,000 prize money and the sponsor has left the question of the money split to Leonard and Baiding.

The series, coinciding with B.C. Centennial celebrations, starts June 10 with matches in five centres: Kamloops, Kelowna, Princeton, Victoria and Vancouver.

Incidentally, both Baiding and Leonard will return to the coast in August for the \$47,000 Centennial tournament in Vancouver.

St. John Ambulance Superintendent Reports on Free Two Hour Classes

Free two-hour classes will be held in artificial respiration during the week of May 12 to 17. R. S. Hart, District Superintendent of St. John Ambulance in Acton, announced today. The classes are part of St. John's "Save a Life" Week held annually in all parts of Canada.

"Save a Life" Week is scheduled just before the swimming and boating season so that people spending their vacations by the water will be prepared to help victims of water accidents. Those wishing to take the classes will be held at the Robert Little school auditorium each evening during the week, with regular telephone 609-W, 741 J 2 or 624 R.

St. John Ambulance said that, in addition to holding free classes for the public, they would be happy to supply instructors for groups at service clubs, home and school organizations, women's clubs, school classes, industries or neighborhood groups. The classes are useful also as refresher courses for people who have learned artificial respiration before.

Mr. Hart pointed out that the St. John Ambulance Brigade would have 1,000 Canadians each year die in drowning accidents. Only automobile accidents and falls cause more accidental deaths.

"Save a Life" Weeks held in previous years have been responsible for saving a number of lives. One dramatic example took place in Ontario where a man, rather reluctantly, took the two-hour course at the suggestion of his employer.

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
