(Continued from Page One) ing the occasion of the decision. It was revealed the two subjects had been deleted on a motion of the board with a tie vote and the chairman had cast the deciding ballot. An interchange of Georgetown and Acton pupils was planned to offer these subjects. It was noted that Milton had accommodation for both subjects.

Chairman McConachie suggested if Acton and Georgetown had wanted the subjects, they could have maintained them if they had voted for them. Details of the vote were sought but clarification was not complete.

M. M. Robinson, a member of the committee suggested he was all in favor of consolidation. "The work in Burlington has strengthened my faith in consolidation," he explained.

Mrs. Mary Pettit, Milton, suggested that after hearing the Georgetown argument, she felt there was a tinge of dissatisfaction in the board. It doesn't seem to be financial," she continued, suggesting every member of the board should work for the benefit of all and that centralized administration was very beneficial.

Questioned on the voting on the District Board motion to ask confirmation, it was revealed the vote had been unanimous with one abstaining from the vote. Douglas Sargent, Georgetown, noted that some of the representatives on the board were county appointed and commented that fairly regularly they came from the same sections.

C. D. Headquarters Locates in Milton

The Halton County civil defence co-ordinating headquarters was set up this week in the former Mason hall on Main Street, with Brigadier G. E. H. Smith in command. From the Milton headquarters, the corps will have direct control over all Halton training groups.

Included in the installation is a 27-foot radio tower and installation of a radio set which connects the Halton group with regional civil defence headquarters at St. Catharines.
