

## Ontario's Dairy Queen for 1958 To Receive All-Expense Tour

Ontario's Dairy Queen for 1958 will receive an all-expense tour to Great Britain by Pan American Airways, according to an announcement just released by R. J. Jardine, chairman of the Ontario Selection Committee.

This competition, as in former years, is jointly sponsored by the Ontario Milk Producers' Co-operative Board, the Canadian National Exhibition, the Toronto Teleregion.

Since the competition was inaugurated in 1956, Halton contestants have dominated the contest with Mrs. Gordon King of Oakville.

### Yellow Rocket Weed Spreading in Halton

Yellow Rocket in the past few years has spread rapidly across Halton County. By the time this appears in print, its bright yellow flowers which resemble those of common Mustard, will be conspicuous in many fields.

While it belongs to the mustard family, Yellow Rocket blooms two or three weeks earlier than Mustard. In addition, Yellow Rocket has a multiple crown and often has a number of main roots, a smooth stem in contrast to Wild Mustard, which has a hairy stem, and more sharply margined leaves.

Then too, Wild Mustard is an annual, while Yellow Rocket is a biennial or short lived perennial. Single plants and small patches should be pulled and burned. At the present time, however, the ground is so dry that most of the plants will break off.

Although Yellow Rocket may be killed by the use of 12 to 16 ounces of 2, 4-D acid per acre, this will also kill clovers and alfalfa, so may be used on pure grass stands only. In meadows containing alfalfa or clovers, some folk are resorting to a knapsack sprayer and spraying the individual plants only.

In such cases, Medforth Pestress recommends a cupful of 64 ounce Brushknil in three gallons of water. Here in Halton we look on "Med" as Halton's authority on weed spraying. Certainly "Med's" many friends and customers hope he will soon be fully recovered and able to resume his weed spraying service.

### Tests Show 1.16% Cattle Reacted

Last week we reported on the progress in the Brucellosis eradication program in Oxford County. The last report from that county states that 348 reactors have been found in the 1,158 herds tested.

Inasmuch as the total cattle population in these herds was 33,008, the percentage of reactors was 1.16. Reactors were found, however, in 13.8 per cent of the herds tested in Oxford.

In the Prince Edward County, the only other county in Ontario where blood testing under the Brucellosis Control Area program has been initiated to date, only 54 per cent of the 9,065 cattle tested have reacted.

In a week's time we anticipate that we may have something more definite to report relative to when the test is likely to commence in Halton.

### Board to Avoid Staggered Time, Raise Salaries

Members of the North Halton High School District Board, May 6, in Georgetown, approved demolishing of the old Georgetown school to accommodate extra pupils from south Etobicoke and avoid staggered hours in Milton in the fall term.

The plan will call for an estimated \$5 or \$6 increasing pupils to attend the Georgetown school until sufficient facilities are available in Milton.

#### Increase Schedule

Principals of the Georgetown and Milton schools emphasized the difficulty in obtaining sufficient experienced teachers for the staff. After considerable discussion, the board agreed to increase the salary schedule providing for a \$2,100 extra allowance, a maximum salary of \$7,000 for non-specialized and \$7,300 for specialist, with minimums at \$4,000 and \$4,300. The principal's maximum was set at \$13,300.

#### Delay Break Up

Board members also approved a resolution to the County Consultative committee requesting that the Board not be broken up at this time. It was suggested the Board would notify the committee when it felt it should be dissolved.

The Board considered with S. H. Barnett the plan for adding the 12 rooms at Georgetown and avoiding immediate demolition of the old school. The need for the 12 rooms by September, 1959, was emphasized and the architect urged to consider the problem and report at the Board's next meeting.

### Approve Plan

Secretary-Treasurer G. O. Brown told members of the North Halton High School District Board, Tuesday, May 6, in Georgetown, that all five participating municipalities had approved the Board's \$1,000,000 building program.

He explained the approvals and requests for the county to issue the debentures had been forwarded to the County Council and would be dealt with at the May 20 meeting.

The program calls for 12 rooms with gym in Georgetown, 12 rooms with gym as a new school in Milton and four classrooms and gym in Acton.

### Junior Fishing Day To Teach Children Conservation Uses

Specially selected pupils from 230 schools were conveyed to a stream at the Albion Hills Conservation area near Bolton on Junior Fishing Day, May 10, said G. Ross Lord, chairman of the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, which sponsored the event.

The young fishermen and fisher girls, all eighth grade pupils, were selected by a quiz program from schools in Chinguacousy, West and East Brampton, Allan, Toronto, Gore, Swains, Weston, York Township, King and Whitchurch Township, Elgin, North York and Lakeshore. Capacity of the two-mile stream fished was limited to 500 children and a supply of speckled trout had been provided again by the Department of Lands and Forests. The area was closed to the public on that day to allow the children ample access to the stream.

Volunteer supervisors, all fish and game club members, drove the boys and girls to the area where they were shown a few fundamentals of angling. In addition, some aspects of wildlife conservation were on display and explained to the children by officers of the Department of Lands and Forests, Authority personnel and the volunteer sportsmen. The object of the outing, stressed Dr. Lord, was to make children by personal enjoyment of outdoors

appreciate the need for support of every type of conservation practice.

Last year 900 pupils from 100 schools took part in the event and about one-third of them were girls.



### Land Judging Contest Receives Approval

At a recent meeting of the 16 Mile Conservation Authority, and also at a meeting of the Land Use Committee of the Credit Valley Authority, both groups approved and provided financial assistance in sponsoring a Land Judging Competition for Halton Junior Farmers and 4-H Club members.

The event is scheduled for Thursday, July 24. It was our privilege to see something of a similar competition held in Peel in 1957, and frankly, we found the competition most illuminating. Certainly there is a lot more to be learned about soils than we had ever previously realized.

Halton farm operators and potential farm operators should, if at all possible, take in this event.


The largest lake entirely within Canada is Great Bear in the Northwest Territories; it is larger than Lake Erie or Lake Ontario.

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
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
