Speaker Outlines 400 Acre Lake Program Planned by Authority

Dr. R. Parker, Acton, of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, in addressing the Orangeville Chamber of Commerce dinner meeting on Monday, May 19, outlined plans for the forming of a 400 acre lake by the authority.

This lake would be created through the damming of the Credit River in the Orangeville area. Mr. Parker assured the meeting the land to be flooded would be cleared well before the time of flooding and added that property owners would be permitted to stock the lake with fish and to plant there had been no objection within the authority on this matter.

Asked if the lake would be maintained at the same level throughout the year, the speaker replied that no guarantee of a sustained level could be given and pointed out the purpose of the dam was for the benefit of the water-shed as a whole.
