He explained in detail many generally unknown facts that, if known, will save much time and expense, such as, "If you phone, I hereby revoke all my wills." This should be in every will, especially where a person has been in the habit of frequently drawing up wills.

Mr. Branda explained that debt takes priority. The special duties of an executor were dealt with, and the matter of succession duties made clear. A native of Acton, Mr. Branda was introduced by Mrs. C. Robinson, program convener, for the evening.
