## Acton Drops Opener 9-3 in Brampton Cold Weather Hampers Playing Ability

Huddled in sweaters, coats and blankets, spectators at the opening intermediate ball game in Brampton last night (Wednesday) saw Acton drop the opener to the home team 9-3.
