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

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## Medicine Frauds Are Special Task Of Investigator

VANCOUVER, May 14.—Oliver Edwards' job is to track down and bring publicity to bear on medical fakes and quacks.

Head of the American Medical Association bureau of investigation, he has spent most of his adult life countering quacks, cultists and friends and the mysterious nostrums they brew.

He brought from his Chicago headquarters his "chamber of horrors," a collection of pills, medicines and machinery guaranteed to cure everything from dandruff to cancer.

He estimated that fake cancer cures gross upward of \$10,000,000 in the United States. Radio and electronic devices, which first entered the field of mechanical quackery early in the 1920s, now are enjoying a revival in the U.S., he said.
