County Planning Discussed Committee Promises to Study

Planning in Halton County on a county-wide basis will be studied by the County Council's planning committee and a recommendation forwarded to council as soon as possible, it was decided on Friday evening when representatives of municipal councils and planning boards from 11 towns gathered at the Court House, Milton, to meet representatives of the Department of Planning and Development.

Termed exceedingly informative by delegates the evening was spent in group discussion comprising representatives of various county bodies, followed by a general discussion and question and answer period conducted by the Department officials.

Although no decision on the merits of a tabling a County planning board was reached, most delegates gathered helpful information to relay to their council, and boards and the county's planning committee was urged to give the matter careful study before any hasty decision is made.

York Represented Special guests at the meeting were members of the York county council which is also studying the new scheme.

John Pearson headed the delegation from Queens Park, assisted by G. Adams, Martin Simian, and Ted Gomme. Each man conducted one of the four discussion groups and reported back to the meeting on each group's findings during the two-hour discussions.

Financed by County Mr. Gomme held the meeting there is now meeting in the Acton acting specifically to County Planning, but the Minister could define a planning area if requested. Financing, he explained, could probably be done on a county basis as part of the county rates.

Summing it up Mr. Pearson noted there's an obvious need for continued discussion between the municipalities in Halton County.

We can't say County Planning is THE thing or that it's necessary in Halton County, he added.

Perhaps Not Ideal Reporting on his discussion group Mr. Gomme added we learned what's involved in administration of county planning. Halton County is not the ideal area. I've admitted but many problems are similar in other towns and rural townships.

Mr. Pearson pointed out that county planning could look after roads, land uses, municipal boundaries, sewage treatment and garbage disposal problems, parking integrations, conservation plans, zoning of government buildings and a general co-ordination of planning.

Also suggested at Friday's meeting was a professional full time organizer and staff with the authority to lay the framework of county planning so that the municipalities could fill in from there.

County planning committee chairman Rev. Doug Sargent of Georgetown chaired the meeting. Walter Clark of Oakville welcomed the delegates.

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
