## Soap Box Derby Rules Announced for Entrants

Stated as top billing of the many features planned for the Motor Sports' big three-day Civic Holiday week-end August 2nd, 3rd and 4th, will be the Soap Box Derby Registrations are being accepted by the committee in charge at the Legion Hall from the hours of 10:30 to eleven.

Following are the rules and regulations for potential car builders wishing to enter the event. The committee suggests that the rules be studied carefully in order that entrants are turned down at the last minute through insufficient knowledge of the rules.

**BOYS' DOWNHILL RACING CAR REGULATIONS**

**1. CHIEF THE RULES**

A Car Derby is open to all children between 8 years and 14 years. It is open to promote boys' craftsmanship and sportsmanship through competition in building and driving racing cars. When you enter the Downhill Racing Car event, you offer to put your own skill in building and driving against that of other boys. Therefore, sportsmanship of fair play requires that your car shall represent only your own skill as its designer and builder, just as when it comes to the race, your performance will represent only your own skill as a driver.

B These rules are designed to insure an equal opportunity to all entrants and they apply to all parts of the car. Therefore, please refer to the Official Rules to the left, and as a true sportsman enjoy the thrill of putting your own ability against the best that the field has to offer.

C Know the Rule. Study these rules over and over and refer to them often while you are building your car, for your car will be carefully inspected before the race and may be barred from competition if you have overlooked or broken any rule.

**2. AGE LIMITS**

A The Downhill Racing Car Event is open to boys and girls 8-14 (inclusive) years of age.

B Drivers should race in accordance with the following classes:

- Class A - 10-14 years (old inclusive)
- Class B - 10-12 years (old inclusive)
- Class C - 8-10 years (old inclusive)

**3. CAR MUST BE BUILT BY COMPETITOR**

A Except as stated hereafter in these rules, the work required in building a racing car, making and shaping the separate parts of the chassis and body, and joining the parts to form the complete car, must be performed by the entrant.

A Wheel size: No car may have wheels more than 12 inches in diameter, including the tires.

B Tires of solid rubber must be used.

C All cars must run on four wheels like an automobile.

D Wheels and axles may be obtained from coaster wagons, tri-
