Warn Council of \$10,000 Deficit

The mayor informed the deputation the possibility of installing a sidewalk on Wallace Ave. was discussed. This would entail receiving permission from A. P. Green Co. and Micro Plastics to utilize the walk on their property. Mr. Irwin remarked it would be nice to have sidewalks down Wallace Ave., but he did not think it was the answer to the problem.

Not Expected

After discussing the problem entailed in placing the suggested sidewalk during the winter, Deputy Reeve J. Green suggested a shoulder-walk could be maintained between the road and sidewalk and the total area completely plowed out by the town workmen.

Mr. Irwin informed council he did not expect a definite decision immediately but would appreciate their consideration of the matter.

It was agreed the road committee would study the situation and go to the Planning Board for advice and direction.

The Acton Fall Fair Board was granted use of the arena on Saturday, June 7, to hold an auction sale.

Sewage Disposal

Councillor J. Guy, chairman of the sewer and water committee, informed council members the pump house at the new well site would be completed within a few weeks. He also said the equipment had not been ordered as they were waiting on an agreement with the companies concerned.

When asked by Councillor W. McLeod what agreement he referred to, the councillor answered a re-opening of negotiations with Beardmore Co. and Canada Packers regarding an industrial sewage disposal plant.

Mr. Guy remarked he had visited Beardmore's to see the pilot plant in operation. He told members Ken Hyde, engineer, reported that good analytical tests are being done with the new pilot plant and it would be possible to design a plant suitable for handling the sewage from these two plants.

Sidewalks

Deputy Reeve J. Green, chairman of the streets and roads committee, asked council's opinion on using asphalt coating for sidewalks. He pointed out the new paving done in the past was not too satisfactory. The chairman told council some people were of the opinion the salt from the road was affecting the paving, and added he understood salt did not affect the asphalt.

Councillor Rachlin informed council he had seen quite a lot of paving done in Toronto and asphalt is not used, but concrete.

"I believe possibly it has something to do with the mix," said Mr. Rachlin and remarked about the stones showing through certain sections of sidewalk on Mill St. He indicated this was his opinion this showed the sand when stones showed on the paved surface.

Councillor Melton interjected by saying he didn't believe any councillor was prepared to give an answer on using asphalt and that it should be judged by an engineer.

Mr. Green suggested a one-inch layer of asphalt could go on top of the present sidewalk area on certain streets and in a short time

would lighten up like pavement.

He also informed council a better guarantee could be received for this type of job.

The matter was left for further consideration.

Rejected Again

The name of the Board of Parks Management came into the limelight again Monday evening when Councillor G. Hartman, also chairman of the board, submitted a lengthy motion asking council's action on the much discussed reduction in the Parks Board grant.

Once again voices were raised and tempers flared as councillors fell into the previously debated subject.

Quarreled down occasionally by Mayor Cook in an attempt to end the debate, council finally agreed to this motion.

"Since much of the Council's time has been taken up by Councillor Barbear in his attempt to convince Council that the setting of the Park Fund rate was done in an improper and illegal manner, and so that no further time will be wasted, this Council, by the passing of this motion as a Council confirms that the method used: (1) restore sum requested; (2) pass the by-law conditionally upon acceptance; (3) ask the Board of Parks Management to consider the reduction. These three steps in Council's opinion, are correct, proper and above criticism."




