Hold Meeting To Organize Safety Council

An organizational meeting to form a safety council in Acton was held in the Y.M.C.A. on Tuesday evening of this week when E. K. MacKay of the Ontario Safety League and C. E. Laybourn, Director of Safety Promotion, were present to speak.

In reporting to the gathering and outlining statistics, Mr. MacKay noted driver education started 25 years ago in the United States and has been in operation in Canada since 1940 starting at Kitchener.

In reporting on the record of Kitchener students, the speaker said there have been 1,200 graduates since 1940 and of these graduates, only four have been involved in accidents. He pointed out that they were completely eliminated.

He also told the group that over 250 graduates in Ottawa since 1951 have never been involved in an accident and only one parking ticket has been issued to a student in this time. The group were informed that surveys show a 50 per cent improvement in the accident record and 45 per cent in police records.

Mr. MacKay pointed out that Ontario statistics prove that on 28 per cent of fatal accidents, teenage drivers are involved. He added that teenagers are involved in 11 times as many accidents as the 45-50 age group.
