## Accept \$3,448 Tender To Construct Culverts

Esquerring Township council held account being passed for payment on their regular meeting in the council chamber in Stewartsburg on May 20. Reeve George Currie presided.

The tender of J. M. Fuller Ltd. was accepted for the construction of two concrete culverts, one at lot 15 between concessions four and five at a lump sum of \$1,728, and one at concession four between lots five and six at a lump sum of \$1,630, according to tender and subject to the approval of the Department of Highways.

The tender cheques of the unsuccessful tenderers were turned turned.

The road superintendent was instructed to purchase sufficient Brink Kill (2-1) to spray the roadside in the township.

Two deputations addressed council, one asking help to clean up the old Anglican cemetery at Novak, and the other asking assistance to stop the closing up of the First Line where the 401 Highway crosses it.

Accounts were passed for payment. Taxes killed H. Wilson, Georgetown, \$10, charged to Acton Fire, Area No. 2, Eason's Clothing Store, 18 pair mitts, \$16.50, J. Nelson, trip to Stratford, \$10, Tuthill Motors, towing \$4, Grants Motors, \$2.15, Thompson Motors, account, \$22.81.

Also passed for payment were A Scott Motors, \$70.50, Bell Telephone, \$19.15, Department of Health of Ontario, \$1.50, Ontario Municipal Board, validation of by-laws, \$4, H.E.P.C., Naval street lights, \$30.88, Georgetown Hydro commission, Glen street lights, \$35.72, Mrs. H. Lawson, typing, \$6.50.

**At Recent Meetings**  
On April 7, a by-law was passed authorizing the construction or alteration of the lines of the Bell Telephone Company on roads or streets under the jurisdiction of the Corporation.

On the same date, a by-law was passed authorizing the temporary borrowing of \$4,000 from the Canadian Bank of Commerce for school purposes pending the sale of debentures.

On April 21, a regular meeting of council was held with numerous club to all who attended.


