Over 300 Attend Dedication Of Acton Pentecostal Church

Many people from Acton and the surrounding districts gathered on Sunday afternoon, June 8, for the dedication service of the new Pentecostal church on Church Hill Rd. The church, beautifully decorated with flowers for the occasion, was filled to capacity with over 300 visitors and members of the congregation. Work on the new church began a year ago under the direction of the minister, Rev. Kenneth Reid who, assisted by the members of the congregation, completed most of the building of the church. The estimated value of the church is approximately \$40,000 and it was erected for \$17,000. The lower auditorium, 36 x 70, is divided into Sunday school rooms and Evangelist room on either side of the assembly hall. The walls of the main auditorium, constructed of cement block, are finished in shell pink. Just off the main auditorium are nursery, cloak room and pastor's study. Acton Wolf Cubs Bid for Honors 57 Boys Attend Annual Cubaree

Acton Wolf Cubs made a determined bid to bring cubing honors back to Acton again this year, but the best they could do was to finish fourth among the 14 District Cub Packs competing in the third North Halton District Cubaree last Saturday afternoon in Georgetown Park. Acton's "B" Pack fought along side the winners but faltered at the end of the day and settled for the last recognized position of fourth place behind 2nd Georgetown "B" Pack, first, 2nd Georgetown "A" Pack, second and 1st Milton "Mohawks" Pack, third. Acton's three packs, "A", "B" and "C", sent 57 cubs to the annual gathering to compete among the 335 boys from other district centres. 2nd Georgetown "B" and 2nd Georgetown "A" packs took the top honors of the afternoon, finishing first and second respectively. The 1st Acton "B" Pack finished third behind Milton "Mohawks". Cubaree 1958 registration figures were at an all-time high with 335 cubs registered, over 100 boys more than any previous cubaree, an indication of the growing interest in cubing in the North Halton District. Leaders attending with these boys numbered 47. Packs were present from Acton, Milton, Georgetown, Glen Williams and Norval. A parade which started from the Chapel Street Public School grounds proceeded through downtown Georgetown to the town park where a flag breaking ceremony and prayer opened the 1958 Cubaree. Andrews Makes British Empire Trials Competes With Top Canadian Runners

Bruce Andrews, 16 - year - old track and field star, from Acton, leaves on Monday, June 16, for the British Empire Games Trials in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, where he will compete in the one mile event. Bruce, who started running in 1955 in Acton with the Y.M.C.A., entered his first long race in 1956 when he ran in the three mile road race in Hamilton and placed 33rd out of approximately 47. Since his first long race, the young athlete has come a long way in track circles and has won the Canadian Cross Country Championship both for Midget and Juvenile. Many Awards A trophy chest cherished by the Andrews family contains 22 trophies and 13 medals as mementoes of Bruce's accomplishments. Accompanying Bruce on the trip out west will be 15 other athletes from the district, including Toronto. The young Acton runner will be housed at the University of Saskatchewan and will be wearing the colors of the Georlph Legion Track Club, for which he runs. He was invited by officials of the Georlph Club to attend the trials if financial arrangements could be made through the generosity of organizations, individuals and friends, more than sufficient has been raised to take care of expenses during the trip. Brother Interested The son of Mrs. Gwen Andrews and the late Hank Andrews, Bruce has two brothers, Keith, 11 years old and Bob, six. Bruce says his younger brother is interested in following in the running line, but Keith is interested only in bowling. In an interview this week, Bruce stated he didn't expect to win a place on the Canadian team, that will compete at Cardiff, Wales, as he will be competing in Saskatoon against top notch runners from all over Canada. He hopes his friends and supporters won't be too disappointed if he fails to make the team but he will be trying his best and will gain a world of experience at the trials. Asked about training regulations, Bruce stated that a lot of it really counts in being in top physical condition. His mother follows the health rules when preparing his meals and cooks her son a huge steak before he enters a race. She also makes sure he is properly rested at all times. Also when he is in training, young Andrews times himself at all times with a stop watch whether running at the Georlph track which he attends three times a week or running the circle at Warren Grove where he lives. University Offers Commencing on his future, Bruce stated he intends to continue running but also wants to attend University, although presently he has not made up his mind what academic training he will follow. He also mentioned he had offers from the University of Michigan and Notre Dame to attend and run for their clubs. A letter if he intended to follow up on these invitations, he stated school in Acton came first as he is only in Grade 11. A quiet and modest individual, Bruce has a pleasing personality. Recently at the Acton High School Field Day when he won intermediate championship honors, proof of his popularity was shown by the loud cheers that echoed through the classrooms. Birthday Present Looking forward to July 4, Bruce hopes to win the Juvenile Mile event of the Canadian Championship Races in Toronto so he can celebrate the following day on his 17th birthday. The Acton runner gives praise to his coaches, Jack McGibbon and Russell Dennis of the Georlph Club, for the time and effort they have spent on training him for races.

Law Captures Snapping Turtle Shoots 30 Pounder in Lakeview

On Wednesday morning of this week Corporal Ray Mason of the O.P.P. Detachment in Acton had a call from an alarmed citizen in the Lakeview subdivision who reported a large snapping turtle at her back door. Upon investigating the complaint found a huge snapping turtle and using the officer's words, "with a weight of 30 or a quart milk bucket", sitting quite determined with its head staring at the resident's rear door. The turtle had been reported in the vicinity before, stated Mr. Mason. Approaching the fence looking turtle with caution, the corporal grasped the animal by the tail held it up and shot it with his revolver. The officer reported the turtle weighed at least 30 pounds and in his estimation appeared to be old. Corporal Mason stated he had removed a shovel from his cruiser and tossed the animal who made a grasp at the blade and held on until he could almost raise it off the ground. In reporting the incident the O.P.P. officer said if any children had been close to the animal they would have easily lost one or two fingers.

Approve Four-Block Rate System P.U.C. to Order Billing Machine

Authorization was granted by Acton Public Utilities Commission to adopt the new four-block rate structure for the town of Acton at their regular meeting on Thursday, June 5, in the Utilities office. The new rate system, recommended by the H.P.U.C., has been checked by the commission and found to be a standard system. It will allow cheaper electricity to the consumer. Chairman J. J. Stewart informed members it was his opinion the new system should be in effect the first of the coming year. Asked what the commission intended to do about purchasing the new billing machine, he suggested the rate system, Chairman Stewart suggested the new equipment be ordered and the commission could decide before the time of delivery if they intended to keep the old machine or not. Clarifying the situation, it was pointed out the old machine presently in use could not handle the various phases of billing necessary under the proposed new system. Therefore the work would have to be done manually, perhaps involving one employee full time. Not in Business for Profit Commissioner C. Lindsay reminded members the commission was not in operation to show a profit and if it was possible to turn something back to the consumers, the new system should be put into operation as soon as possible. He also informed the commission it was quite likely the new four-

block rate system would have to be adopted in a couple of years, therefore it might as well be put into force immediately. Secretary-Treasurer J. McGrath informed members the Georlph rural area had adopted the system, and stated this system would have to be adopted in the near future. The commission agreed to order the new billing machine and adopt the new system the beginning of January, 1959. Sign Agreement A final revised Union agreement was approved by the commission following a review of the revised edition M. J. LeBlanc was present, representing the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. This action followed various meetings between commission members and Union officials. An alteration allowing for a salary increase on April 4, 1959, was inserted in the agreement. Edwin Evans of the Acton Hydro Department was present to represent the employees. Wish Statement Clarified A discussion developed regarding a recent report in the local paper of the council meeting held on Monday, June 2, at which time it was noted Mayor W. H. Cook had remarked on the duties of the town clerk, saying he was at the call of the P.U.C. Chairman Stewart pointed out the statement was misleading to the public and wished it clarified that Mr. McGrath was an employee of the Utilities Commission, who paid part of his salary. Deputy Reeve J. Green remarked it was his opinion the Mayor was calling council down, not anyone else. He added, "There is no need for this." Mr. McGrath informed members he was an employee of both parties and there should be an agreement between both as to what meetings he would attend. The commission agreed the situation should be investigated. Approve Payment Upon notification of a bill from Shottell Sheet Metal for cleaning out a blocked sewer in Warren Grove, it was noted the account had been endorsed by A. Doby, sewer superintendent. Speaking for Superintendent Doby, who was absent, J. J. Stewart informed the commission the superintendent had agreed the cause of the trouble was on town property and therefore was the responsibility of the P.U.C. Request Pipe A letter from the secretary of the Board of Parks Management requested plastic pipe in possession of the commission for use at the park to service the new change stations. After discussing the request at length, it was decided to ask a representative of the Board to attend the next commission meeting to review the situation. The commission agreed to send representatives to the South Central Ontario Waterworks Convention in Galt on June 18.

Much Discussed At Urban Board

Members of Milton, Georgetown and Acton councils gathered in Georgetown last night (Wednesday) for an informal meeting of the North Halton Urban Board. Many topics came under discussion during the meeting, including bills received from the Crown Attorney in all three towns and the size of the district police force. Other matters discussed for general information were the times for starting and ending council meetings and the number of meetings in a year; methods of approving accounts, unions, holidays and work-in hours for town employees; council salaries, fees for the magistrate, charges, insurance and collection for ambulance services; street sweepers and washers; school costs and government grants, and town insurance.

Bandsmen Fete Former Member With Concert

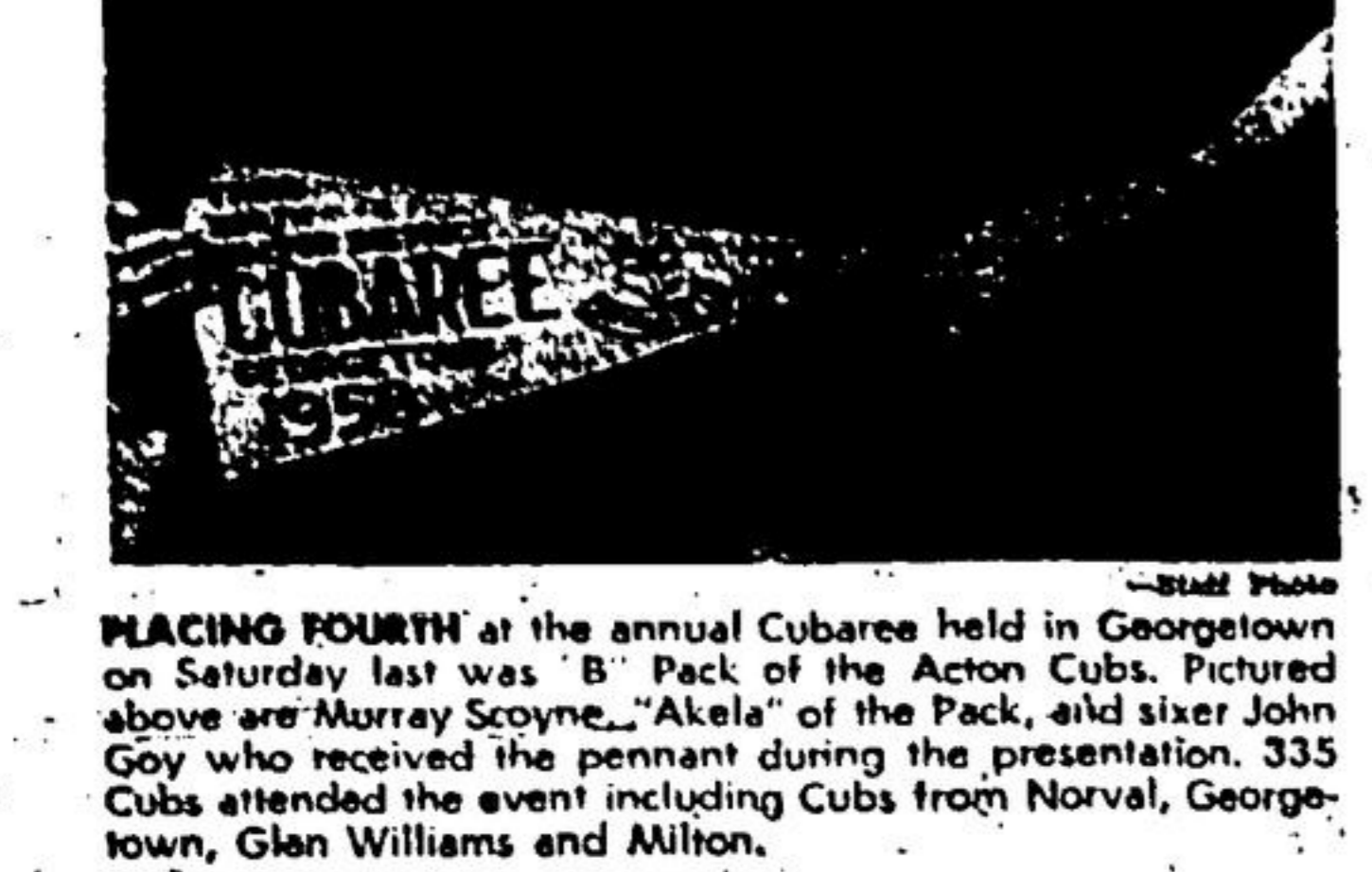

Name K. Hulford To Bowling Exec.

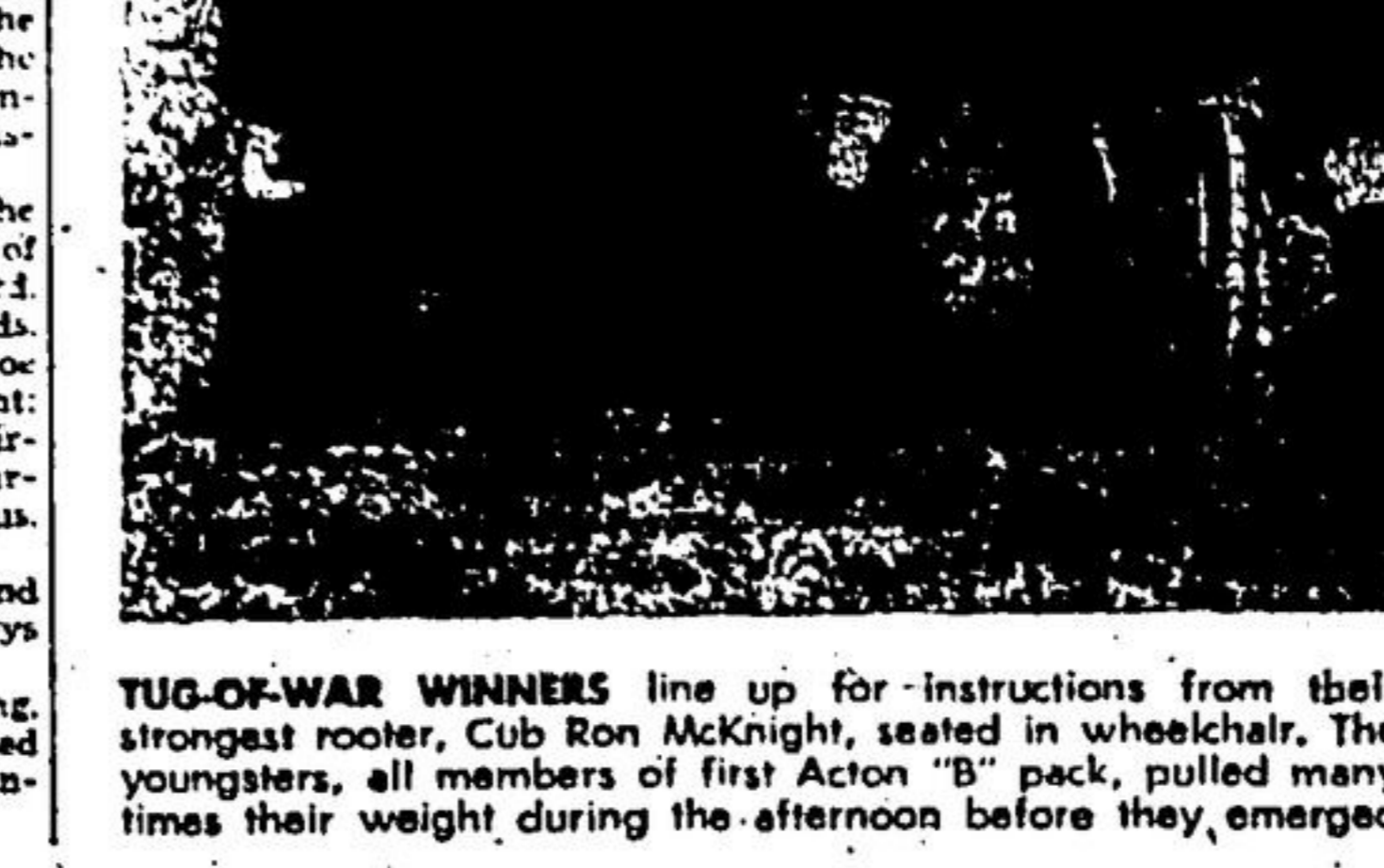

Action Plus

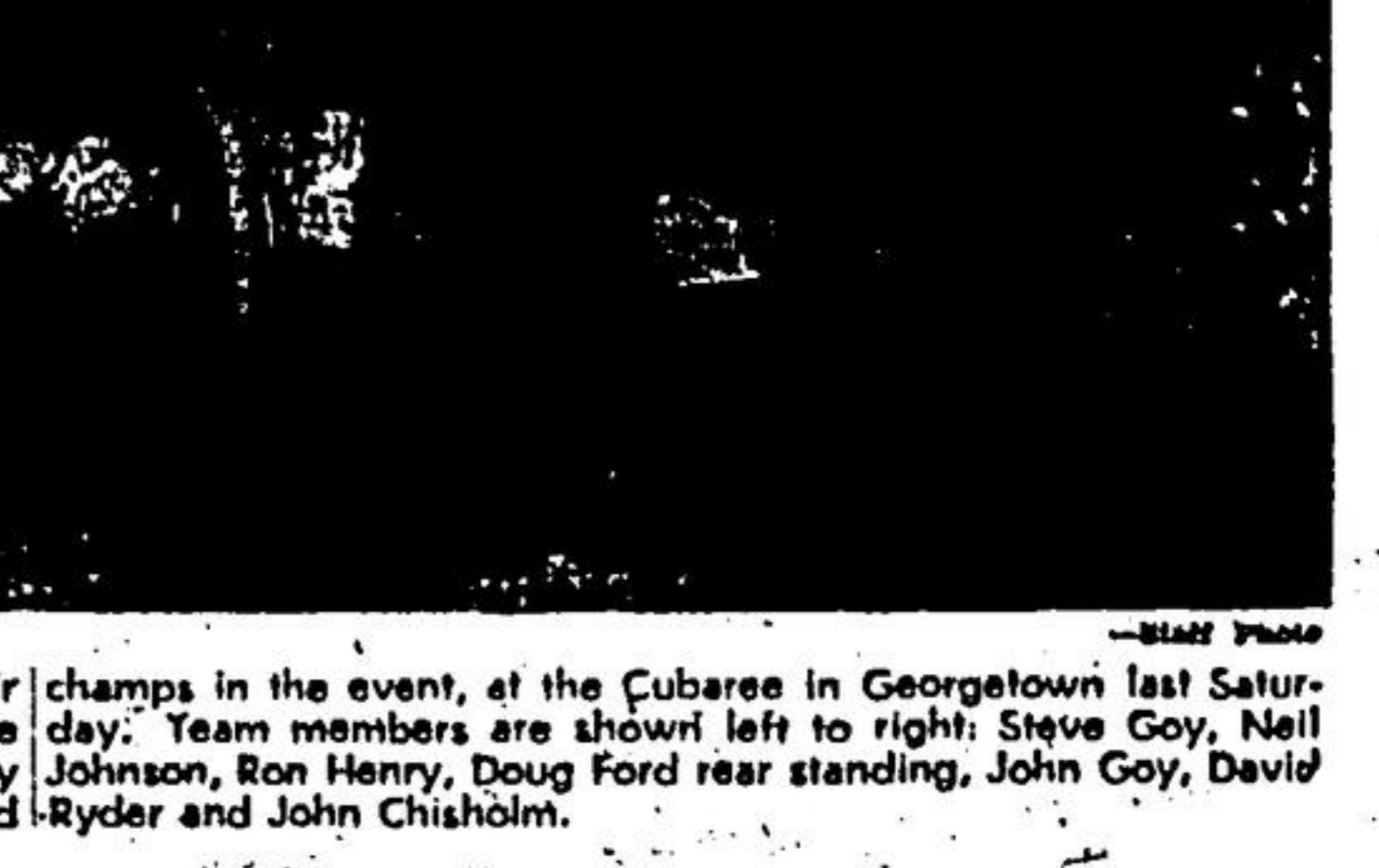
