## Merchants Bow to Brampton Team 11-8 Acton Holds Lead for Eight Innings

**Score Two Runs**

Acton scored three in the bottom half of the fourth when Lawson singled, stole second and advanced to third on a single by Bruce after Morton went down swinging.

After Anderson struck out, Cunningham singled, scoring Lawson and Bruce. Skilling received a free pass on an error by the pitcher and was followed on the same route by team mate McCristall, with Cunningham scoring on the play. Jew-

ell went down swinging to end the rally and fourth inning.

Once again Cunningham bore down and with good support from his backfield, held the Brampton crew scoreless for the next three innings.

In the bottom half of the fifth, Phillips whiffed out and Lawson belted a homer that cleared the right field fence going away. Morton and Bruce were unable to hit the ball, ending Acton's hopes for two runs in this inning.

In the top of the eighth, Hetherington for the visitors, cracked a triple and scored easily on a double by H. Merritt before the side was retired.

Leading 6-4 going into the top of the ninth Acton, faced with a couple of errors, two walks and a number of singles, allowed Bram-

Robinson went in to relieve Cunningham on the mound but lasted only a short time, followed by Jewell.

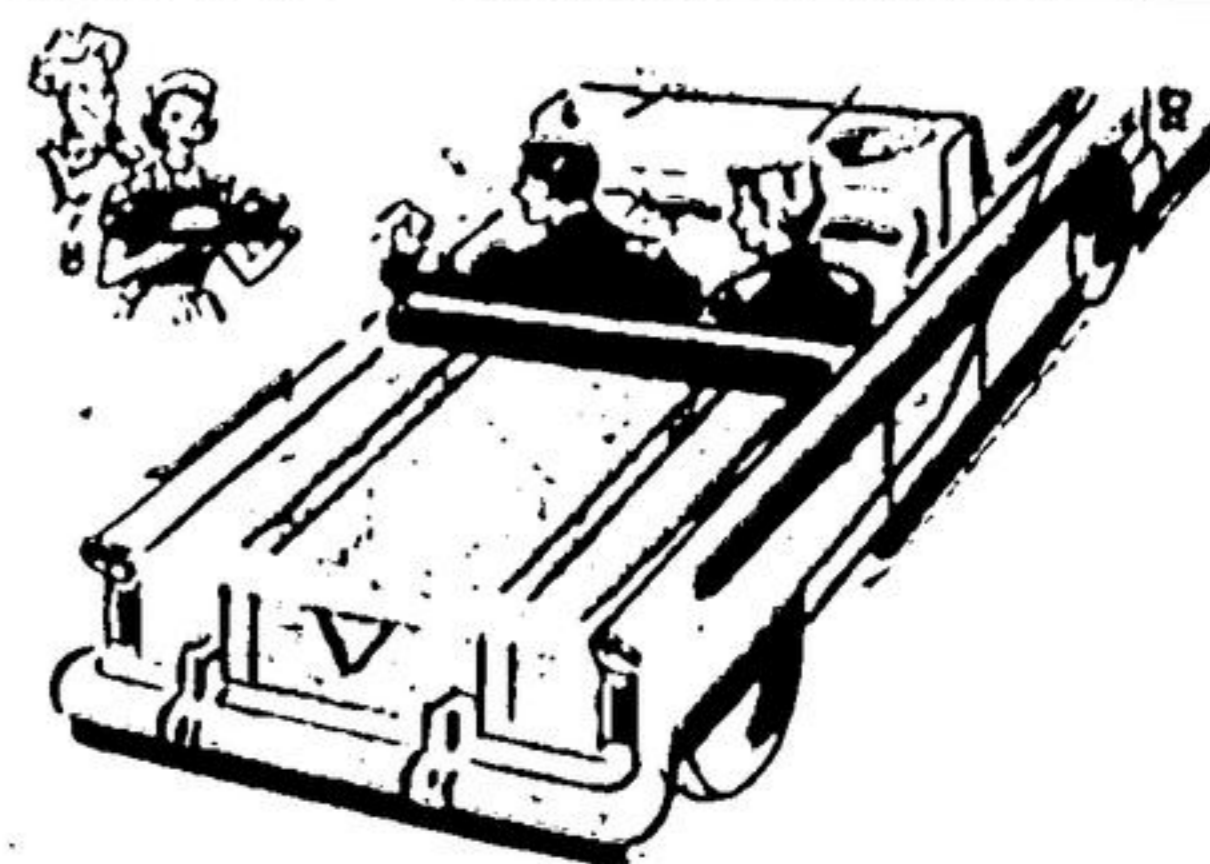
