Oral reasons on five of the classes were taken in the afternoon at the Junior Farmer Building in the Brampton Fair Grounds.

In the evening, the young people and their parents met at the Agricultural Hall in the Milton Fair Grounds for the announcement of the awards and presentation of prizes.

## HALTON COUNTY WEED CONTROL NEWS

**POISON IVY**  
Poison ivy is a perennial plant, most commonly found at summer cottages, picnic grounds, school yards, bathing beaches and campsites. It causes misery and discomfort to many people, and everyone for his own protection, should learn to recognize this plant.

Poison ivy is a creeping vine which has alternate leaves, each of which is divided into three distinct leaflets, usually way in appearance, 2 to 4 inches in length, and pointed at the tips. White or green flowers are found in clusters on long stalks, and later turn to white berries about the size of a pea.

This weed need not be confused with Virginia Creeper. Ivy has three leaflets and white berries, while Virginia Creeper has five leaflets and blue berries. Just remember the old rhyme: Leaves three, turn and five; Leaves five, leave alive!

In order to have this "Vacation Spoiler" controlled, patches of Poison Ivy found growing in public places should be reported to your municipal authorities. The Ontario Department of Agriculture have recommended several chemicals for its control including 2, 4-D brush-kill and sodium chlorate.

A new chemical called ATA (Amino Triazole) is now considered to be the most effective. This chemical, applied when the plants are in full leaf at the rate of four tablepoons to a gallon of water, gives satisfactory results. When treating small areas, an ordinary knapsack sprayer may be used to thoroughly wet the plants with the solution.
