During the program, 270 district farmers were conducted in groups on a tour of the farm by members of the Field and Soil Husbandry Department of the O.A.C., who explained the work that is being carried out at the station.

### Highlights

Highlights of the tour included variety tests on wheat, barley, rye, oats, forage, established tests, seed production in forage crops, straw materials, 20 different hay varieties, and lime studies on soils.

At the conclusion of the tour, Dr. Dan Huntley, head of the Field Husbandry Department, delivered a very enlightening address to the entire gathering which was followed by refreshments.

### CITIZENS PLEASE BE ADVISED

Pursuant to the Weed Control Act, Section 12. Notice is hereby given that every occupant of land and the owners of unoccupied land and alleyways within the Town of Acton must cut down or otherwise destroy noxious weeds thereon as often as may be necessary to prevent the ripening of their seed, and to keep such lands free from noxious weeds during the summer.

In the event of this notice not being complied with within the month of June the Town will proceed under the Act with the destruction of these weeds, charging the cost of same to the respective owners.
