CITIZENS PLEASE BE ADVISED

Pursuant to the Weed Control Act, Section 12, Notice is hereby given that every occupant of land and the owners of unoccupied land and alleyways within the Town of Acton must cut down or otherwise destroy noxious weeds thereon as often as may be necessary to prevent the reaping of their seed, and to keep such lands free from noxious weeds during the summer.

In the event of this notice not being complied with within the month of June the Town will proceed under the Act with the destruction of these weeds, charging the cost of same to the respective owners.

THE PRESERVING KETTLE

Here's an easy way to make successful Strawberry Marmalade which your family will go for.

STRAWBERRY MARMALADE
4 cups prepared fruit (1 orange, 1 lemon, and about 1 quart ripe strawberries);
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar
1 bottle Certo

First, prepare the fruit. Cut 1 medium-sized orange and 1 medium-sized lemon in quarters. Remove seeds. Grind, chop fine, or slice crosswise water thin. Add ½ cup water and ½ teaspoon soda. Bring to a boil. Simmer, covered, 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Crush thoroughly about 1 quart fully ripe strawberries. Combine fruits and juices and measure 4 cups into very large saucepan.

Then make the marmalade. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil. Boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove heat, stir in Certo, and stir until dissolved. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover at once with ½ inch hot paraffin. Makes about 10 medium glasses.
