Under this heading a letter was read from solicitors Downey, Shand, Robertson and McLean, which stated that the band by law was invalid as it did not conform with the petition submitted by the band three years ago.

To review the situation three years ago Acton Citizens' Band members had submitted a petition signed by a sufficient percentage of the population of that time. As a result of the petition, a vote was called and a plebiscite by the ratepayers granted a half mill subsidy to band or bands in Acton.

**Junior Pipe Band**

Since the organizing of the Acton Junior Pipe Band and a request from the papers for a grant from council the wording of the plebiscite was discovered to be different from that on the petition.

Respecting clarification of the situation, council directed the clerk to write the solicitors and ask an answer.

After reviewing the problem the solicitors considered the by-law invalid. Council drew up their charges and filed applications and directed across the table Deputy Reeve W. Greer stated that if legal action was taken, the court would rule on the intent of the plebiscite.

Councillor W. McLeod remarked the people had voted for what appeared on the ballot at the time of the plebiscite.

Councillor Essoff enquired what would happen to the outcome and equipment if the band disbanded and was informed by clerk McLeod the town would claim the uniforms and equipment not privately owned.

**Motion Referred**

A motion was submitted to grant the Junior Pipe Band \$100 for 1958. Deputy Reeve Wilson suggested the motion be referred to the finance committee for further consideration.

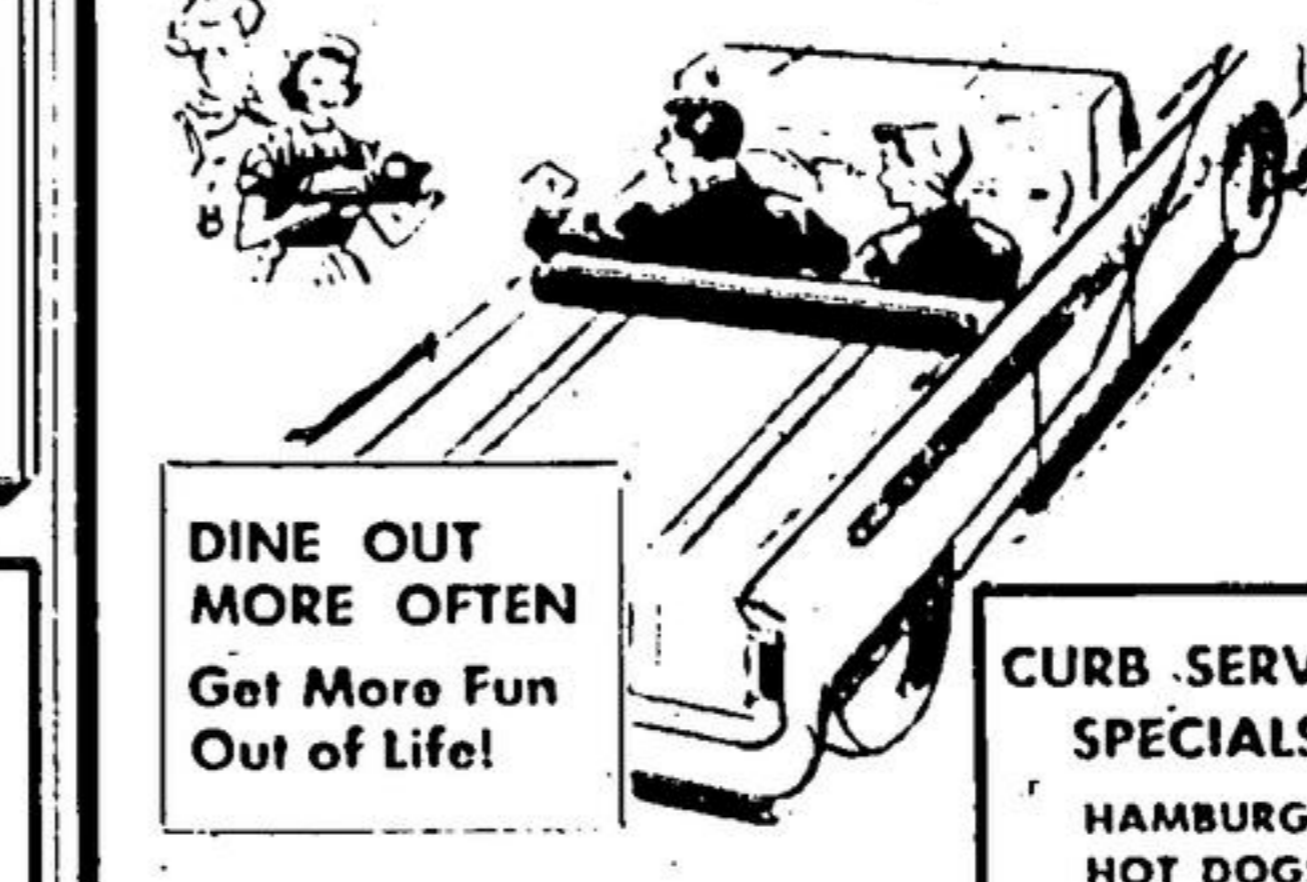
