## Third Annual Dance Revue Held in School Auditorium

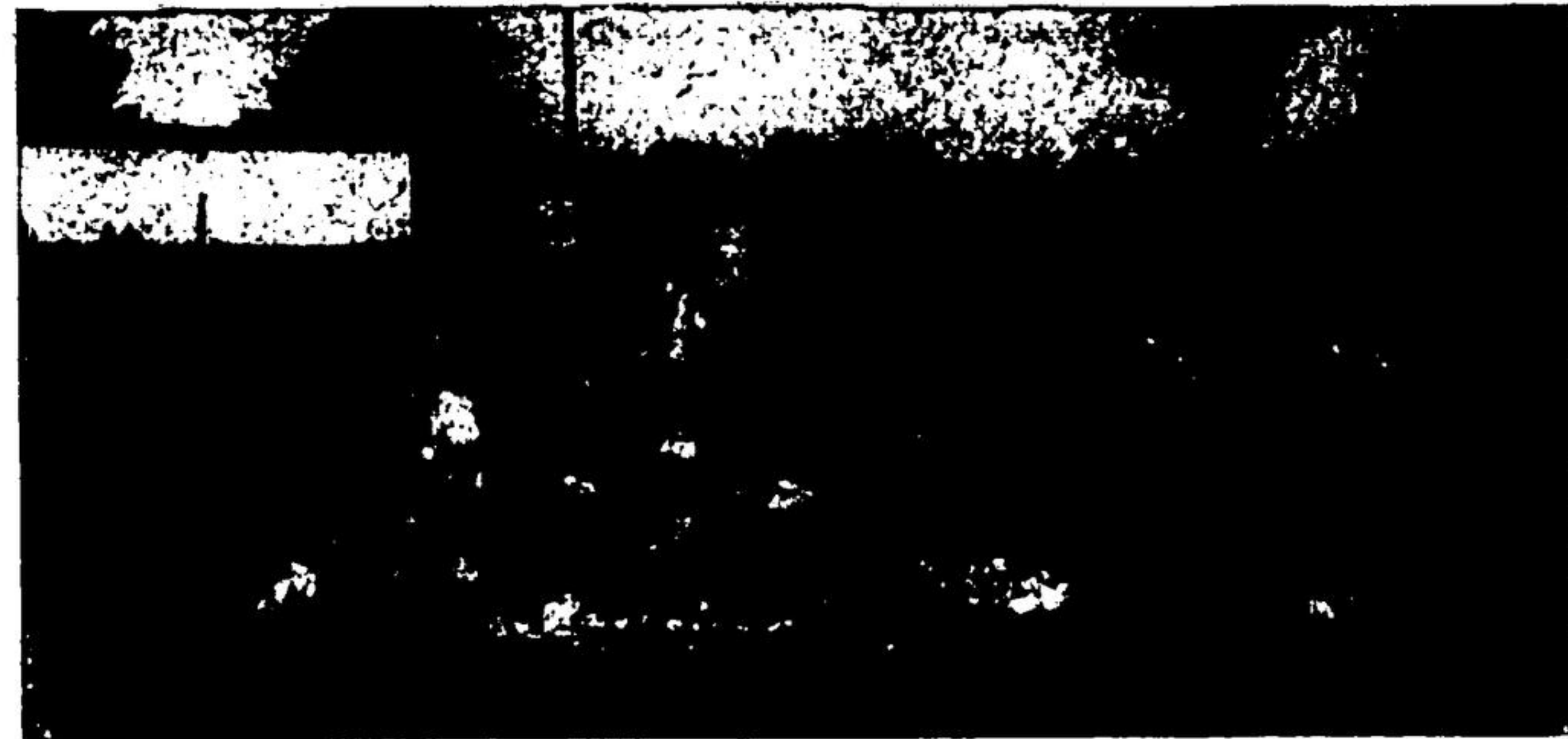
**Mrs. O. Moran Hostess To W.M.S. Auxiliary**

Arrangements were made for the July meeting and over a cup of tea all had time to greet friends of former years and wish bon voyage to the president, Mrs. A. J. Buchanan.



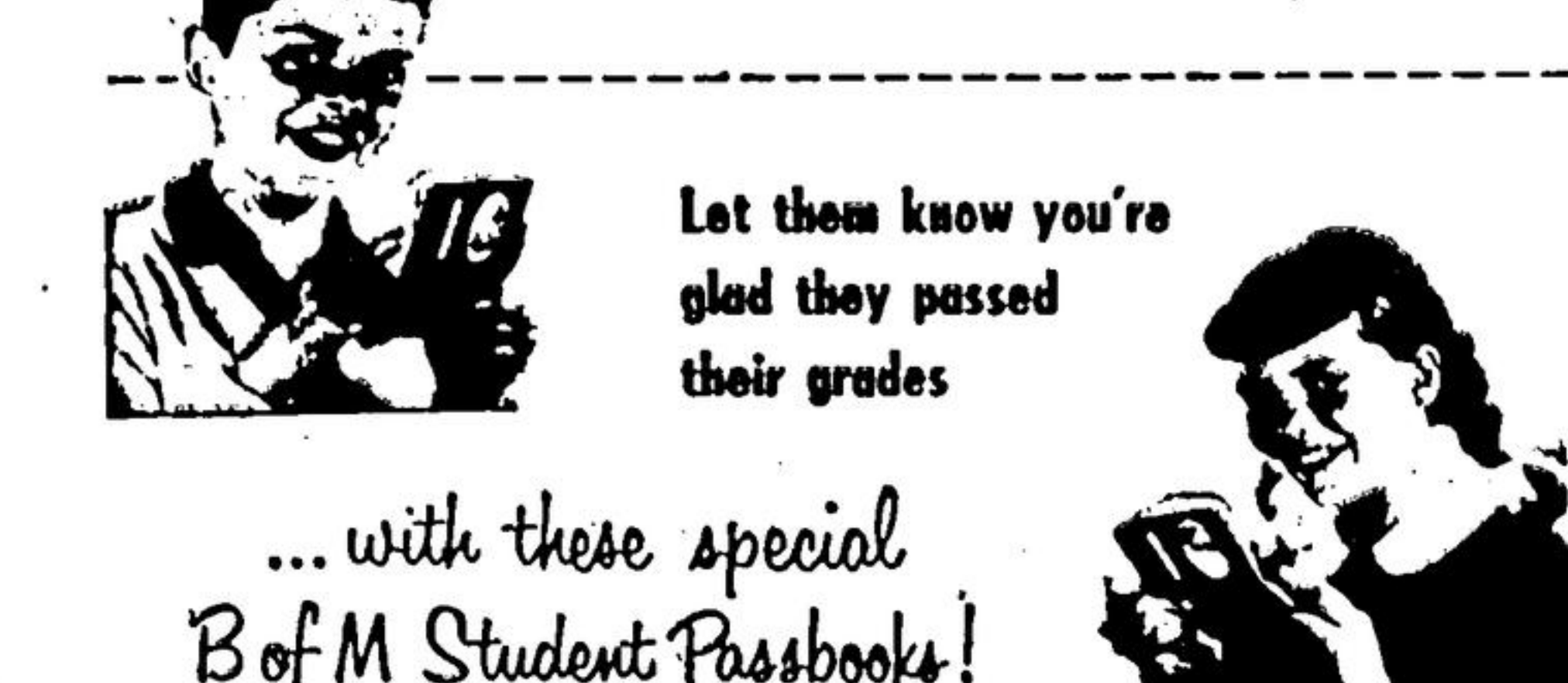

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## Former Acton Resident Named in Burnett Will

A clause in a Collingwood man's will leaving over \$6,200 to "some destitute and deserving person" was declared void recently by Mr. Justice Wells at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, because of the uncertainty of the clause.

Named next of kin in the will were Mrs. Annie Parnell of Halton Manor, Milton, formerly of Acton, and Mrs. Ira Madill of Markdale.

The bequest was made in the will of the late Alexander Burnett of Collingwood, who died in April, 1956. He appointed John Cowan of Toronto the sole executor of his estate, and ordered in his will that \$2,000 cash and a mortgage worth \$1,200 be given to some destitute and deserving person chosen by Mr. Cowan.

In February, 1957, Mr. Cowan died before the request could be fulfilled. Mary Ann Cowan was named executor of her husband's estate and asked a ruling on Mr. Burnett's will.

**"We Got Troubles" On Exchange—C. of C.**  
OAKVILLE - The annual exchange of students between Dorval, Quebec, and Oakville youngsters is giving four arrangers a headache. It seems that the only local students interested in visiting Dorval are girls, while the only French Canadian students expressing an interest in coming here are boys.

"We got troubles," said Chamber of Commerce manager Allan Klarr.

The idea behind the exchange visit is that the Oakville students be billeted from July 3 to 16 at homes of Dorval students who will come to Oakville from July 16 to 31 and stay at the homes of their guests in Dorval.

The trip is being arranged by Rev. R. D. Jones, executive director of Inter-Community Visitation in co-operation with Chambers of Commerce in Oakville and Dorval.
