Liberals Name L. Whiting Prexy Hear Ontario Leader's Challenge

Halt County Liberals at their annual meeting in Milton Friday elected Lester Whiting president and named a completely new executive after a lengthy debate on the possibility of amending the constitution to provide for a different state of officers.

Owen Mullin, Burlington, fired first shot when he submitted an organizational chart that he sought to have adopted. It provided for a past president, president, secretary, treasurer, young Liberal organizer, four township vice-presidents and eight committee members.

It was explained no constitution of the organization was available and during discussion it was suggested a new one be prepared.

Following motions, amendments and revised motions members agreed to elect an executive similar to previous ones with the executive being empowered to accept representatives into the executive from meetings held in each township.

First vice-president elected was E. Hennessy, second vice-president Dorothy Mullin, secretary J. Harkin, treasurer Terry Campbell.

Resignations from the previous executive were submitted by Vic Hall, treasurer and Ken Dick, secretary.

President L. Whiting expressed thanks for their service in the organization.

Provincial Leader of the Liberals, John Wintermeyer, praised the meeting in his opening remarks. "I like action and I think this was an action-packed meeting."

"Liberals are not a dead party. They are a party that sees a new purpose in this Ontario in the near future", he suggested.

Reviewing the results of the by-elections he noted they were held just two weeks after the Liberal general convention but in each of the four they increase their popular vote.

"In Ontario today the people are ready for a change in government. They want to see a responsible government. We must demonstrate that we are a responsible alternative to the present government", he claimed.

He challenged his audience to work together with objective and determination.

He explained that in Ontario there are 24 boards administered by representatives appointed by the government. "Much of the performance of government is in the field of commission divorced from government", he challenged.
