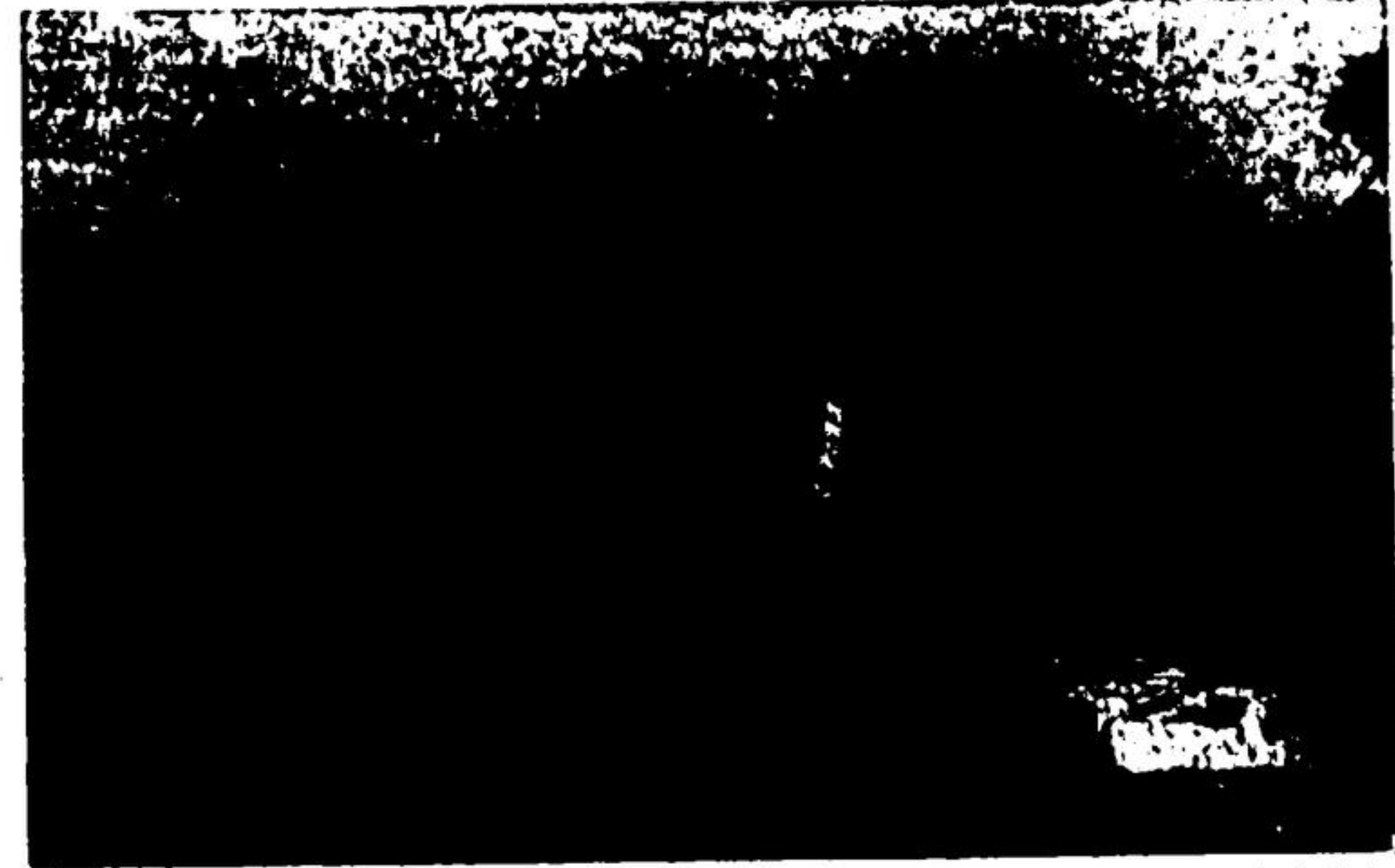

Best All-Round Patrol
The Hawk Patrol of Milton were graded the best all-round patrol and at the final horseshow were awarded the shield. The 18 other patrols competing were graded on their efforts and were awarded 'A' or 'B' grading. Camp Chief Fred Cooley of Norval presented each patrol with their pennant and grade.

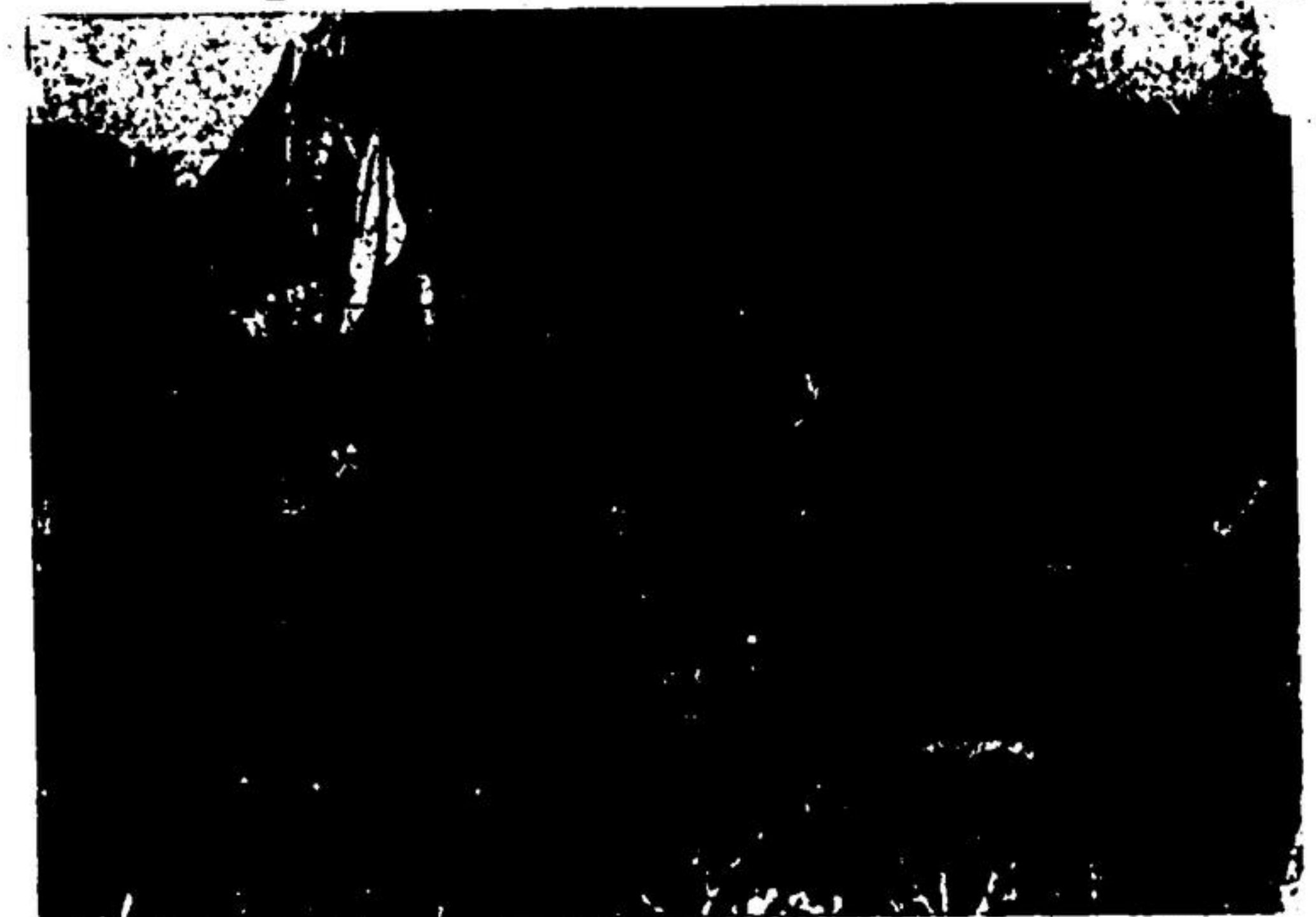
Grading was based on the inspection of the Scouts from the time they arrived at the campsite with their packs, through their use of the campsite, cooking and Scouting skills, until their packs were again packed and the campsite cleaned up again.

Scouts who had taken the Patrol Leaders' training course earlier this year at Milton were presented with their Bronze Arrowhead and certificates by District Scoutmaster Roy Young of Milton.

Sunday morning, a Scout service was conducted by Rev. Gill of Norval. During the camp, leaders from all troops were present and assisted the camp chief, Fred Cooley, with the inspections and operation of the Camporee. There was an average of 14 Scouts present at all times during the camp.

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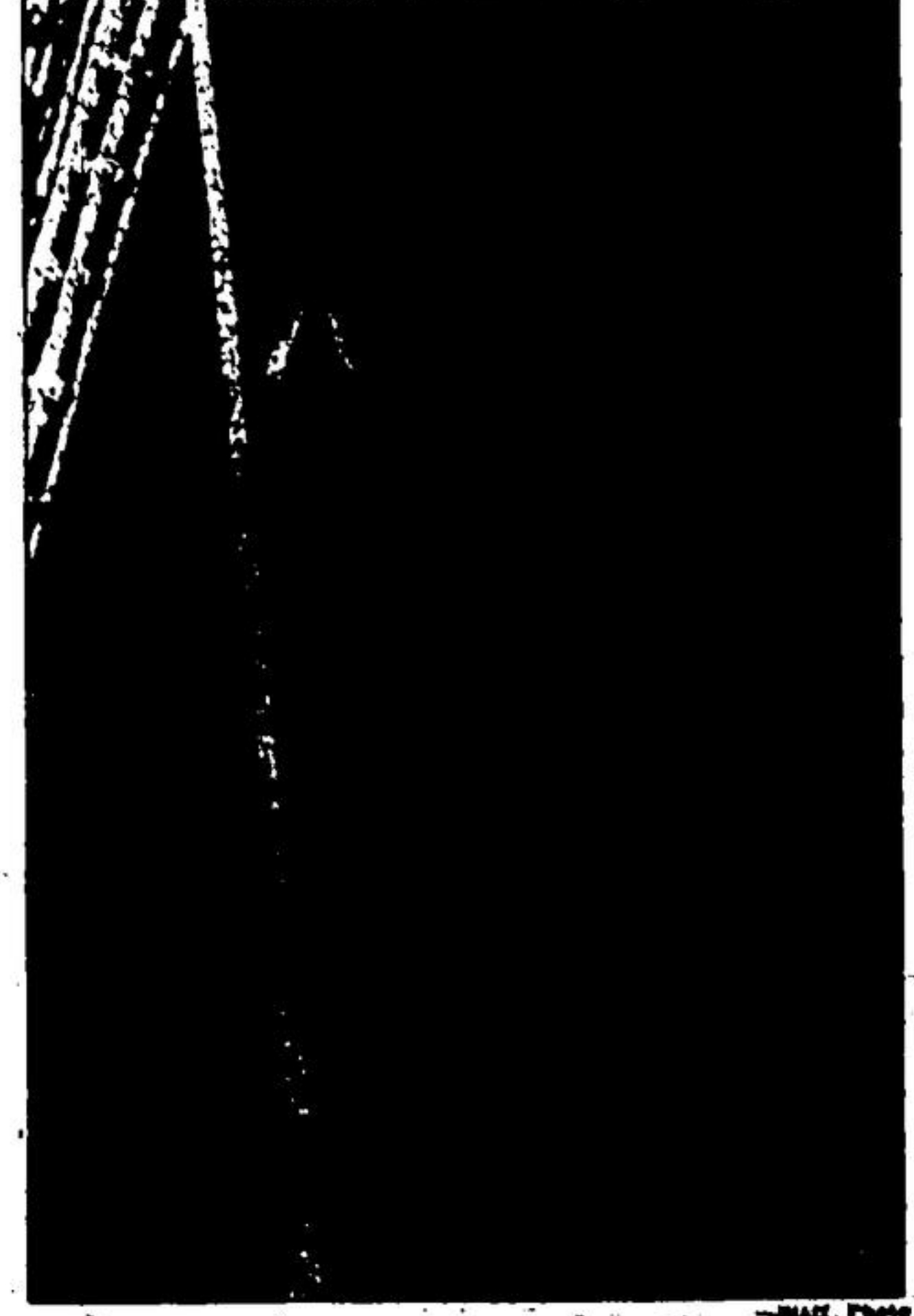
