Arthritic Enjoy Swimming Periods

MONTREAL, Ronald Steppacher, 23-year-old swimming enthusiast, once a week drives two or three arthritic sufferers to the O'Connell Pond for therapy and takes a dip in the pool with them.

Mr. Steppacher, a salesman was one of the first volunteer drivers when the Montreal branch of the Canadian Arthritic Society started therapeutic treatment for 20 persons living in widely-separated parts of Montreal. There are nine drivers now, but Mr. Steppacher is still the only ardent swimmer.

For the arthritic victims temperatures of the water in the pool is increased to 80 degrees from a normal 73.
