"Is it really worth while?" Those persons who were fortunate to have their television sets tuned to Channel 13, Kitchener, on Sunday, June 22, at 6:05 p.m. on the Telescope Hour with Elaine Cole as M.C., were readily convinced that the answer to this question was in the affirmative.

Here they viewed the pupils of Sunshine School of Milton and District Association for Retarded Children as they demonstrated their rhythm ability as taught by Mrs. Buckner of Acton, with Mrs. George Elliott, Milton at the piano.

**Interviews President**  
In her opening remarks Elaine Cole interviewed G. G. Addison, president of the Association, who informed the viewers there are some pupils in attendance at the present time. This school has been in operation for three years and to date there are 48 such schools in Ontario, with approximately 1,300 pupils in attendance. There are three out of every 1,000 persons afflicted with retardation. This proves what the future picture will be and the problem involved for all citizens of Canada.

**Outline Training**  
Mrs. Buckner, who teaches rhythm to the pupils was then introduced and gave the reasons for the training of these pupils by asking the question "Is it Worth While?" She claimed the outstanding talent of these pupils is rhythm and she further demonstrated this by having the pupils keep time with their sticks to various tunes. Concentration was then demonstrated as they applied action to music to the tune of "Jack in the Box". Coordination and relaxation were demonstrated by the action song of "My Wee Wee Donkey". Skipping, Marching, Rhythmic Ball Tossing and Hooping also demonstrated coordination.

**Trafalgar Studies Tree Planting Report Urges Immediate Start**

TRAFALGAR—Township Council is studying a plan to plant trees on the Township's roads and streets as shown by a report given to the council, by George Ball of the Township Engineer's Department.

The report stated the township should start as soon as possible to plant a planned selection of trees on Township roads, along a plan much similar to the one used in Hamilton. The report lists the types of trees suitable for the various soils and locations. It also lists the types of trees that can be adapted as a buffer strip between commercial and residential areas.

Reeve Alex Phillips says he would like to see the program start this fall. It should be done in two ways to replace the municipality's trees. Firstly trees should be put along all the public right of way and secondly a program could be started whereby individual property owners could secure trees. This second method would have to be in the form of a contract stating that the property owner would do his best to look after the trees.

"This program, of course cannot be instigated until there is sufficient water in the Township," the Reeve added.

Councillor J. H. Wilmott said "Mr. Ball's report is wonderful and this plan should be started soon. As well as roads and residential areas,

industrial areas should be tree and beautified," he added.

"It breaks my heart to see the Second Line look like the Sahara desert. This is a plan that will still be useful 50 or 100 years from now," added Reeve Phillips.

According to the report, the trend is toward a more planned selection of trees. A person suffering from burns is in urgent need of first aid. Until medical aid arrives, the patient should be kept warm and his clothing need not be removed. Any clothing stuck to the burned area should not be pulled off. Blisters must not be broken. Cover burned area with sterile dressing. Very small burns need only cleansing with water and application of a sterile dressing.
