

TCA ANNOUNCES SEATING PLAN ON DC-8 JETLINER

When Trans-Canada Air Lines puts its six DC-8 Jetliners in service in 1960, each aircraft will accommodate 127 passengers—28 First Class and 99 Economy. Each cabin will have its own double galley, washrooms (with flushing toilets for the first time in any YCA airplane), cloakrooms, inter-communications and public address systems and music in flight. The forward part of the aircraft will contain a lounge accommodating eight passengers. There will be four doors, two for passenger loading and two for aircraft servicing. The cargo compartment will hold five tons. The huge Jetliners will go into service on YCA's transcontinental and trans-Atlantic routes, cutting flying time almost in half.

Join Silver Wedding Reunion Celebration

About 70 descendants of Robert and John Root returned on July 5, to Robert Root's old home on Lot 20, Con. 3, Erin Township for a family reunion and to celebrate Mr. and Mrs. Hanna Root's 25th wedding anniversary. In 1790 Henry Root came to Beamsville Ontario with other United Empire Loyalists who crossed the border at the time the oldest son, John, settled in Erin Township in 1826 before the city of Guelph was founded. John's oldest son, Robert, cleared the farm where the reunion was held and has been in the family since 1847, being owned successively by Robert Root, David O. Root and now John H. and Hanna Root.

Two Dead, Five Injured Police Charge Trucker

Five Rockwood youngsters are injured, their mother and grandmother killed, and an Acton man charged following an accident near Elmira Monday.

Mrs. Hubert Logan died in hospital and her mother, Mrs. Laura Barton of Palmerston, was killed instantly in the head-on collision at the base of a hill. All five of the Logan children, passengers in the car driven by their mother, are still in Kitchener-Waterloo hospital.

The Logan family lived in Guelph for five years before moving to Rockwood in 1956. Mr. Logan is a millwright at the International Malleable Iron Company in Guelph. He was at work when the accident occurred.

Provincial police who investigated the accident reported the crash took place on a hill west of Elmira as an empty gasoline tank trailer truck driven by Robert Emmerson of Acton was passing a third vehicle, Mr. Emmerson, who lives in Warren Grove, escaped uninjured. He has been charged with criminal negligence and careless driving.

Amazing Possibilities Are Seen for Oakville

OAKVILLE: "Amazing possibilities" for the potential of Oakville's commercial area are seen in the results of a three-year survey released this week by the Oakville Trafalgar Chamber of Commerce through its manager, Allen Klarer. In his report, Mr. Klarer notes "Over a period of three years, the chamber has been able to assess the market analysis of Oakville on a broad scale through contact with business people, developers, government departments and other sources." "The potential of the commercial area, keeping in mind the water areas surrounding Oakville and verging on the eastern outskirts of Hamilton, and the western outskirts of Toronto, has amazing possibilities."

"C. B. Whitfield, statistician for the Department of Economics, in a letter to the chamber in 1957, quoted the following: 'In 1951, retail trade for each person in Oakville was 82 per cent. higher than it was in the whole of Ontario. I have simply supposed that these ratios have not changed in recent Ontario retail trade totals.'"

Per capita sales in Oakville, says Mr. Whitfield, were \$1,836 in 1951, \$1,870 in 1954, and \$1,756 in 1955. Comparative figures for the same three years for the whole of Ontario were \$980, \$918, and \$865. "Oakville's higher ratio," he comments, "are probably caused by the high income of the people in the area, and its position as a market town."

He was released on bail. The five Logan children, David, Bruce, E. Larry, T. Robert, G. and Dawn, received numerous injuries but all were in satisfactory condition today (Thursday). They are believed to have been in the rear seat of the family car when the crash took place.

The injured were attended by Dr. F. J. McCullough and Dr. J. K. Thompson of Elmira, Constables Edward Fazio and Peter Gross and Cpl. Charles Salter of the Kitchener detachment. The tank truck was owned by Municipal Tank Lines Limited, who employ Mr. Emmerson.

Mrs. Logan was the only daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Barton of Palmerston. Mr. Barton was C.N.R. station master at Palmerston until his death. They were traveling to Palmerston at the time of the accident. Mr. Logan was active in the Second Axis Loyalists.

Funeral services were held yesterday (Wednesday) in Palmerston. Larry suffered severe concussion and a lacerated ear. Bruce had extensive lacerations in the abdomen and Robert slight concussion and lacerations to the forehead. David has a broken thigh and extensive bruising, while Dawn, the most seriously hurt, has a broken leg, ribs and extensive cuts and bruises. She celebrated her fifth birthday last Sunday. At latest report today the boys were sitting up and the girl was declared out of danger.
