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Scale Models Help Chart Radio Waves Meeting Obstacles

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Dr. J. Remo, Whitehead research director of the company, explained that when radio waves strike an object they scatter. The pattern can be calculated easily with a standard method when the object is straight-edged. But something more is needed to find out where the signal is strongest when the waves hit irregularly-shaped mountains.

The team is conducting experiments, attempting to develop mathematical equations for predicting the patterns and hence, the best site for a transmission tower.
