Hog Producers' Marketing Vote Shows 77% Favorable in Halton

Halton hog producers turned out to the polls on Friday to cast a 77 per cent vote in favor of a Province-wide co-operative hog marketing system. Of the 206 who cast ballots, 227 were in favor of the scheme while 60 voted "no" to the move.

The Halton vote showed a 61 per cent in favor, just over the

above-average plurality for the year, as the Provincial average was necessary two-thirds majority vote to implement the scheme proposed by the Ontario Hog Producers' Association.

Trafalgar township voters gave the system the biggest majority when only seven of the 50 voters cast unfavorable ballots. Closest vote was in Burlington (formerly Nelson township) where only one ballot separated the "yes" from the "no" totals. In the two northern townships, the votes proved about three-quarters were in favor of the system.

Official returns in the provinces showed 12 counties had not received sufficient favorable votes. Lennox and Addington showed 39.42 per cent in favor, while the vote was 39.72 favorable in Waterloo.
