Hauled Near Lake

After the last outdoor sanitary accommodation, which had been erected some years ago, was hauled to a safe and convenient spot near Fairy Lake, gallons of gasoline and oil were poured on the building and fire chief J Newton lit & natch to the remains

A demonstration of fire fighting methods was put on by the fire department, with one unit using portable pump from the lake to the truck and relaying the stream of water through several lines of hope to the fire . The second unit dropped the

sucker line into the lake, drawing water immediately through the pumping system onto the fire. Quearh Fire

Hampered by weeds clogging the system, firemen were delayed in getting streams of water on the fire Finally water was played on the burning building and firemen had the blaze out in short order. Relighting the still smouldering embers, the fire department repeated their feat for the second time before finally letting- the building go up in flames With a few bystanders at the

building finally destroyed, firemen gathered up hose lines and returned to the fire hall.


