

## Back to School

### Expect 900 Pupils at Public Schools Hire New Teachers, Utilize Extra Rooms

An estimated 900 pupils from kindergarten to grade eight will return to classrooms in Acton's two public schools this coming Tuesday morning.

To handle this increase of over 100 from last year, 27 classrooms are available with 28 teachers on the two staffs.

Fifteen of the classrooms are sit-

uated in the Robert Little School and 12 in the M. Z. Bennett School. For the purpose of allocating the pupils, the town has been divided roughly by the C.N.R. tracks. Acton's two public schools are the M. Z. Bennett school and the Robert Little school.

All pupils living west of the C.N.R. tracks including South Street and Main Street North will attend the Robert Little School.

**Robert Little School**  
Principal G. W. McKenzie will teach grade eight. This year he will head a staff of 14 teachers at the Robert Little school. Under his supervision will be nine teachers who were on the staff last year and five new teachers.

New additions to the teaching staff at the Robert Little school include Mrs. Dorcas Byrman, formerly of Brussels; Mrs. Mary Gordon, from Terrace Bay in Northern Ontario; Miss Marlene Taylor, Owen Sound; Mrs. Mary Jane White, Chesterville; and Mrs. Jane DeLathion, formerly Jane Watkins of Acton, who is returning after teaching in the south of the county.

### Expect 240 Pupils at H.S. Engage Two New Teachers

High School Principal E. A. Hansen expects an enrollment of over 240 students on the first day of school next Tuesday morning when a staff of 12 teachers utilizing six many rooms will be on hand to start the fall season.

Again this term, grades nine and ten girls from Acton High School will go to Georgetown one-half day a week to take Home Economics. Grades nine and ten boys from Georgetown will come to Acton five half days a week for classes in shop work.

The principal expects about 12 students to take Upper School work in grade 13 this year.

Two new teachers have been engaged at the High School with one replacement and one additional teacher, giving a total staff of 12 teachers.

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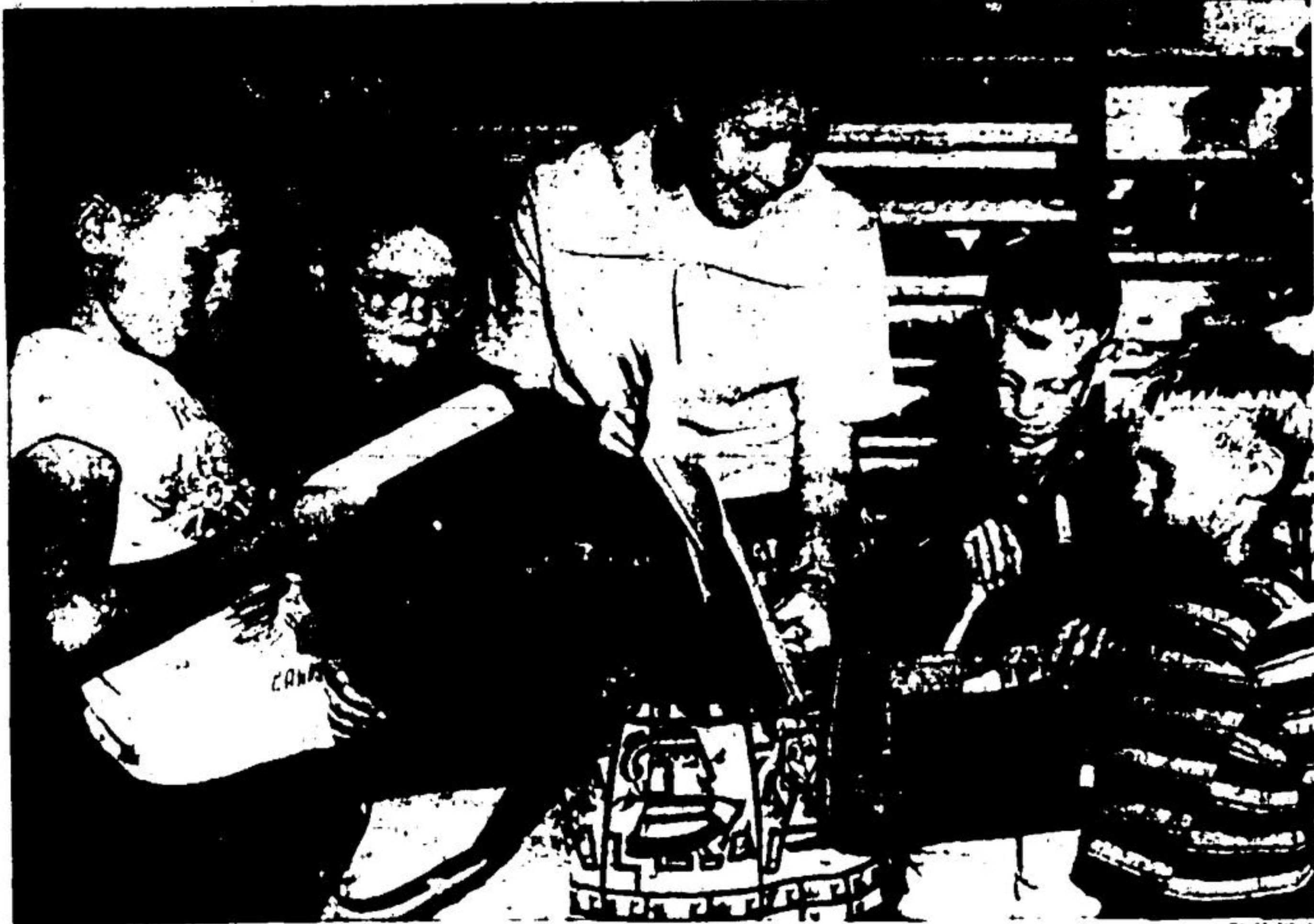

Merchants report that children have been getting their school supplies and clothing in anticipation of school opening next week.

At Georgetown, the eight-room Park school is still under construction. Opening this fall is the new Percy W. Merry school at Drummond, Trafalgar township, including seven rooms and a playroom. Another new Trafalgar school is the John Wilson school on the Third Line, a 10-room unit.

In Esquesing, the influx of pupils meant the opening next week of the new Stewarttown school, five classrooms in addition to the old two-room school across the road.

At Oakville, the board is preparing to call tenders on a replacement for the old Central School, the new Elmwood School west of Kerr Street, comprising six rooms and playroom.

And what are the plans for the future in Halton's public school education? Burlington is seeking approval for 16 new classrooms. Georgetown plans a new 10-room school in the Heslop subdivision. And Milton is making plans for a six-room addition to the Denney school.

And E. J. James, business administrator of the Trafalgar board says they'll soon have five new schools built west of Oakville, below the Dundas highway. One is the 10-room Brookside School between the Third and Fourth Lines south of the Q.E. Way, now in sketch plan stage.

Prior to his appointment as inspector, Mr. McNeil served as public school principal in the Township of North York in the Metropolitan Toronto area, in the city of Peterborough and in the Manvers Township Schools in Durham County.

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## 90 Rooms to Come

### Open Seven Halton Schools
