Use Electric Trap To Kill Lampreys In Spawning Areas

LONDON (The C.P.P.) Scientists and field workers at the Fisheries Research Board station here have set 1000 baiting traps to kill the larvae of the troublesome sea lamprey.

There are 2000 streams and tributaries running into Lake Huron and in some of these the lamprey larvae are killing hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of fish annually. Bad conditions prevail for spawning. More than half of these streams have been investigated and 400 found to be infested with lamprey spawning streams.

Entirely Different

We go into Norway tomorrow and a new currency and people. We have found the people of Denmark and Sweden very friendly but entirely different in their ways. There are few hotels in Sweden although beer can be bought with meals in a hotel. All wines and hard liquors apparently have to be procured with a permit.

This may have something to do with their prosperity, but having not been invaded during the war may contribute to their well-being.

Hamburg, Germany, was the place that impressed me most. It was practically destroyed during World War II but a new, very modern city has risen out of the ruins.

Our country is an ex-Guardian and was sent out to Hamburg immediately after the war to try to help reorganize the police and restore law and order. He says so much damage was done to Hamburg as 80 per cent of all damage on the British Isles, including Coventry.

Every citizen was given the equivalent of \$500 in our money and they started from there. It may be all built on a rubble and could burst at any time. However, from my experience of the Germans, it will continue unless war intervenes again.

Lunch in London

We met Mrs. Ken Knox in London a couple of weeks back and had lunch with her. The 3rd of July Free Press had just arrived so we all had a go at it.

While in Paris we met Misses Margaret and Jessie Young who were staying at the same hotel. Then we met them again on the boat while crossing the Channel to England. It is a small world indeed now.
