Magazine Features New Plant at Acton

The H. K. Porter company magazine called Porter People, Products and Places, features the new plant at Acton in its August issue. There are seven pictures of the plant, some of them taken by a Free Press photographer.

The magazine will be in the front office window of the Free Press this week.

The story reads:
Construction of Porter-Canada's new 80,000 square-foot, single-story plant, on a 60-acre site in Acton, Ontario, has been completed well ahead of target date. Begun in late January, the building received its first shipment of machinery early in July. Initial production began on August 5 and full-scale operations commenced on August 12.

Permanent Headquarters
Porter-Canada's headquarters for both Daxton division, located until recently in Toronto, and for the new Refractories division, which was located in Guelph, the modern Porter building marks the second stage in a well-integrated expansion program for H. K. Porter Company (Canada) Limited.

Porter-Canada's expansion began in 1957 with the acquisition of the Federal Wire and Cable Division.

Opening of the building also marks the first move of Daxton Division, Canada, from its original Fraser Avenue, Toronto, plant, which was constructed in 1950.

The lack of moving 500 tons of raw materials, machinery, furniture and inventories to the new site was begun the first week of July, and was completed in three and a half weeks. With all the production facilities located under one roof, engineers were able to lay out separate production lines for the manufacture of the many products of Daxton, creating economies not possible at the old location.

Announce Open Season, Limits For all Halton Game Hunting

Open seasons and bag limits for upland game birds and small game animals for 1958 have been announced by the Hon. J. W. Spence, Ontario Minister of Lands and Forests.

These include open season for ruffed grouse, sharp-tailed grouse and spruce partridge, October 4 to November 13 inclusive, for Halton County. Bag limit is set at five in the aggregate per day and 20 in possession in the aggregate.

Hungarian partridge are in open season from September 27 to November 15, with a limit of eight per day and a possession limit of 16.

Partridge is in open season from September 1 to April 1, 1959, with a bag limit of five per day and a possession limit of 15.

Mr. Spence also warned hunters that it just takes a little fire to make a big one. There are three basic components of a fire—heat, oxygen and fuel. If you can remove any one of the three, you have the fire licked, he notes, urging hunters to be careful with fires.

Iron Hitching Posts Downed for Progress

GEORGETOWN—One of Georgetown's last and most elegant links with the horse and buggy era was reluctantly severed recently when two iron hitching posts which, since the late 1800's, have complimented the shoulder of Church Street in front of the present residence of Mrs. Annott Early had to be removed by town men to allow for road widening and resurfacing.
