## Pars Seven-Holes, Hits Two Bogies M. Holmes Wins Acton Open

Crowned champion golfer during the Action Open Golf Tournament held at Orangeville Golf and Country Club on Saturday, September 6th, Mick Holmes carried off the trophy from 32 other golfers with a low gross of 82 for 18 holes.

Playing a stellar game of golf, the new 1958 champion shot the 18 par course with seven par holes and two bogies, completing each nine with a 41.

Vying for honors as runner-up were Gord Beatty and D. Butler (Toronto) with 88 strokes; Julian Zajic, 89; Rev. A. H. McKenzie and George Hall, 90 each; and Don Black (London) and Harold Morris (Toronto), 91 each.

### Low Net

Roy Butler trotted home with the trophy for the low net as he led the field with a handicap of 76 to turn in a score of 85 using the Atlantic system for handicaps.

Trailing close behind the trophy winner were T. Tyler Jr., 88; J. McGrath, 82; J. Goy, 82; H. Kinrade, 72½; D. Drysdale, 73; C. Peycha, 73½; J. Goy, 74; A. Nolan, 74; K. Flynn, 75; R. McKay and B. Coon Jr. each won a prize for coming closest to 100 and Mike Coon was presented with an award for not losing all his balls.

### Money Prizes

Most honored banker award went to W. Woodburn and C. Lindsay for the best score with the fewest clubs.

The only golfer to beat his son, B. Coon Jr. was presented with a prize for his effort and former low gross went to L. Hemmey.

The golfer best suited to stick to teaching, Don Green was presented with an award and G. Williams received a prize for the highest gross using plastic clubs.

For the longest drive of the day, Ted Tyler Sr. was presented with a carton of cigarettes. He drove the ball from Acton.

Other prize winners were: C. Varyo, throwing club; the farthest, J. Drysdale, lowest hidden hole; J. Gunn, highest hidden hole; J. Krupick, most 5s and S. Brunelle, on third.

In spite of cloudy skies, 37 Action golfers headed for the nine-hole course at Orangeville and with rain threatening at one time, continued play and ended the day's activities with a bright sky overhead.

Following the presentation of trophies and other awards, the committee under chairman Mike Coon gave a round of applause by the golfers present for the fine day's entertainment.
