Twp. Council to Mark New Bridge Opening

Ceremonies for the opening of the new Rockwood bridge and for Remembrance Day were discussed when Erasmus township council held their regular September meeting on Monday evening at Rockwood town hall. All members were present and Reeve Joseph L. Oakes presided.

A representative of a company making a front end loader, Robert Healey, spoke to council and proposed to arrange a demonstration with the machine in the near future.

Assessor Thomas D. McCutcheon returned the 1958 assessment roll on which the 1959 taxes will be based. On a motion by councillor W. Rutherford and D. Forsythe, the roll was received as presented.

Mrs. Helen Laverty explained some insurance to council which was accepted.

Ralph Tait asked to have a ditch made on No. 10 street, which was agreed upon.

Legion Arrangements Council was informed by James Milne that the Acton branch of the Canadian Legion was willing to make the necessary arrangements for the Remembrance Day services to be held in Rockwood.

It was moved by deputy reeve P. DeLham and T. Marsden that council request the Acton Legion to conduct the Remembrance Day service on the Sunday nearest November 11.

Bridge Committee Mrs. Hazel Mack spoke to council suggesting that some form of ceremony be arranged for the opening of the new bridge in Rockwood.

Councillors Marsden and Rutherford made a motion that Reeve Oakes, deputy reeve Benham, Mrs. Mack, F. Schneider and H. J. Saunders be a committee to arrange a program for the opening of the new bridge, a part of No. 7 Highway at Rockwood, which was carried.

Reveals Items Reeve Oakes reported that he and clerk S. Royce had interviewed H. Hungerford regarding the following items: the school debenture by-law, the auditor's correspondence acting for R. J. Smith, the division court summons regarding E. G. Blakely and the Everett Albert Street municipal drain by-law.

Reeve Oakes and the treasurer were authorized to apply to the department of highways for the interim subsidy on the 1958 road expenditure.

Accounts amounting to \$2,483.47 were passed for payment.

Work With Wool School Trains 4-H Leaders To Teach Homemaking Clubs

A two-day training school for leaders of the fall project for Halton 4-H homemaking clubs, "Working with Wool", was held in the Board Room of the Ontario Department of Agriculture office in Milton on Tuesday and Wednesday, September 16 and 17.

The course was conducted by the County Home Economist, Mrs. Mabel Borgstrom with the assistance of Miss Marie Wright of Simcoe County.

Instruction included a study of the nature and properties of wool and the fabrics into which it is manufactured, the choice of suitable pattern and material for making a wool skirt which will fit into the club member's wardrobe and be becoming to her, use of commercial patterns and the actual construction of the skirt.

Mrs. Borgstrom urges rural girls between the ages of 12 and 20 to join the 4-H homemaking clubs. Two projects are held each year, one started in the fall and one in the spring.
