Plan Historic Tour Along Credit Valley

An unusual opportunity to take part in one of the most interesting tours of the Credit Valley and Peel County historical spots will be offered the public on Saturday, September 27 when the Women's Institutes of Peel and the Peel County Soil and Crop Improvement Association will join forces with the Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Historical Sites Advisory Board of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority in sponsoring the project.

Widen scope For some years the Peel County Soil and Crop Improvement Association has been staging a Farm Family Conservation Tour timed to coincide with the turning of the leaves in the Fall. This year it has been decided to widen the scope of the activities and to extend a cordial invitation to the general public to participate.

The tour will be in a 100-mile round trip through the ever beautiful Credit Valley with the entire emphasis on historical sites and early history of the area.

While the starting point for the trip has been arranged for 9:30 a.m. at Brampton Fair Grounds, it will be possible for private parties to pick up the cavalcade of cars and buses at any desired point or leave when necessary. For that reason the approximate times the tour will reach various stops en route are included here.

Year Events After leaving Brampton, the procession will go to Frontville via No. 10 Highway and No. 9 Highway, arriving there at 10 a.m. Here an opportunity will be given to see some of the old buildings and hear a short discussion on Indian history and early pioneer settlement.

The tour will then continue through Streetsville following the Credit through to Midwayville and Churchville. Here homes of United Empire Loyalists will be seen and a visit made to one of the very old Peel cemeteries.

A short discussion will be held on the development of that particular area and at about 10:30 the gathering will proceed through Norval up the Tomlinne to Georgetown where the famous old Barber's Mill will be visited.

Barber's Mill This was first a wooden mill about a century ago and then became a paper mill. Leaving here about 11:20 a.m. the tour will journey to the beautiful Terra Cotta Conservation Area, owned by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

This year alone the Terra Cotta Park has been the mecca for thousands of families enjoying outings for the day. Please bring your own lunch basket to be enjoyed picnic style. Hot coffee is to be supplied by the Conservation Authority.

Following the hour-long lunch period from 12 until one o'clock the tour will start again and travel through Cheltenham, Boston Mills and Inglewood to the spectacular Parks of the Credit and Cataract Junction where a lunch break will be given of the picnic developments and one o'clock odd such there.

Pioneer Grind Mill Leaving the Cataract about two or 2:30 o'clock a visit will be made to the pioneer grind mill at Acton which has been in operation more than 100 years.

Leaving Acton about 3:10 p.m.

The next part of the trip will be through Caledon Village to the Fourth Line East and the old stone church erected in 1853 where the story of early settlement in this area will be told.

Leaving here about 4 o'clock the touring group will head homeward along the fourth line east, a truly beautiful road with a magnificent view.

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Tips on Touring

Summertime need not be the only time for eating out-of-doors for motor-home families. It's hard to beat a fall cook-out in the crisp, cool days of autumn.

So pack up your car with vegetables and utensils and head for a provincial or national park or some park-like spot in the area. Such parks cater to outdoor cookery with ready-made grills. But even if there isn't a provincial or national park near you, simply take along one of the new, inexpensive portable grills in the luggage compartment.

Prepare For It

You can take the labour out of your fall cook-out by preparing some of your dishes at home in advance. Keep the fun in by cooking your main meat dish over the open fire. Grilled steaks and barbecued chicken always have a special tangy taste when they are cooked and eaten out-of-doors.

For a unique picnic treat, prepare the American speciality, Kasha. Just cut pieces of lamb or beef into small squares. Then skewer alternate layers of meat, tomato and onion, either on a metal rod or green stick and roast over low coals. An already-prepared barbecue sauce will add that important, extra flavour.

In Own Containers

Beforehand, at home, put your hot dishes, such as soup, Spanish Rice or vegetables in the new, water-mounted Thermoses. Salads and desserts can be placed in separate plastic or cardboard containers.

Course will consist of 12 two-hour lessons, commencing Monday and Tuesday, October 20 and 21, at 8:00 p.m., and each Monday and Tuesday following until November 24 and 25, recommencing on January 12 and 13 and continuing on to February 16 and 17. The basic fee for all courses is \$5.00. Two Dollars of which must be forwarded with the Application Form. The balance of Three Dollars must be paid on Registration Night. A special Registration Night will be held at the High School on Friday, October 17, at 7:00 p.m., at which time the balance of fee must be paid and students will be given itemized lists of requirements for the first class.

(1) The Welding course fee will be \$15.00. Five Dollars with application and the balance on Registration Night. This fee covers all equipment and supplies the student will need.

(2) The Leathercraft course will cover leather assembly or leather binding or leather carving, whichever the student wishes. It is estimated that cost of equipment in the leather carving course would be about \$20 for beginners. In all instances students will pay for the cost of materials used.

(3) The Metalcraft course will cover either Aluminum Etching or Copper Tooling and Jewellery.

(4) The Silk Screen Printing lessons will be conducted at the studio of Mrs. Hoey, Eden Mills. Transportation will be arranged and paid for by the students.

(5) Square Dancing fee will be \$10 single, \$15 double, with classes at Georgetown. A minimum of 15 applicants must be secured for each class. The Committee reserves the right to cancel or carry any class it wishes.
