The ladies had quite a successful day at Milton Fair with their booth despite the hail and rain storm. All plans are made for Georgetown on Saturday.

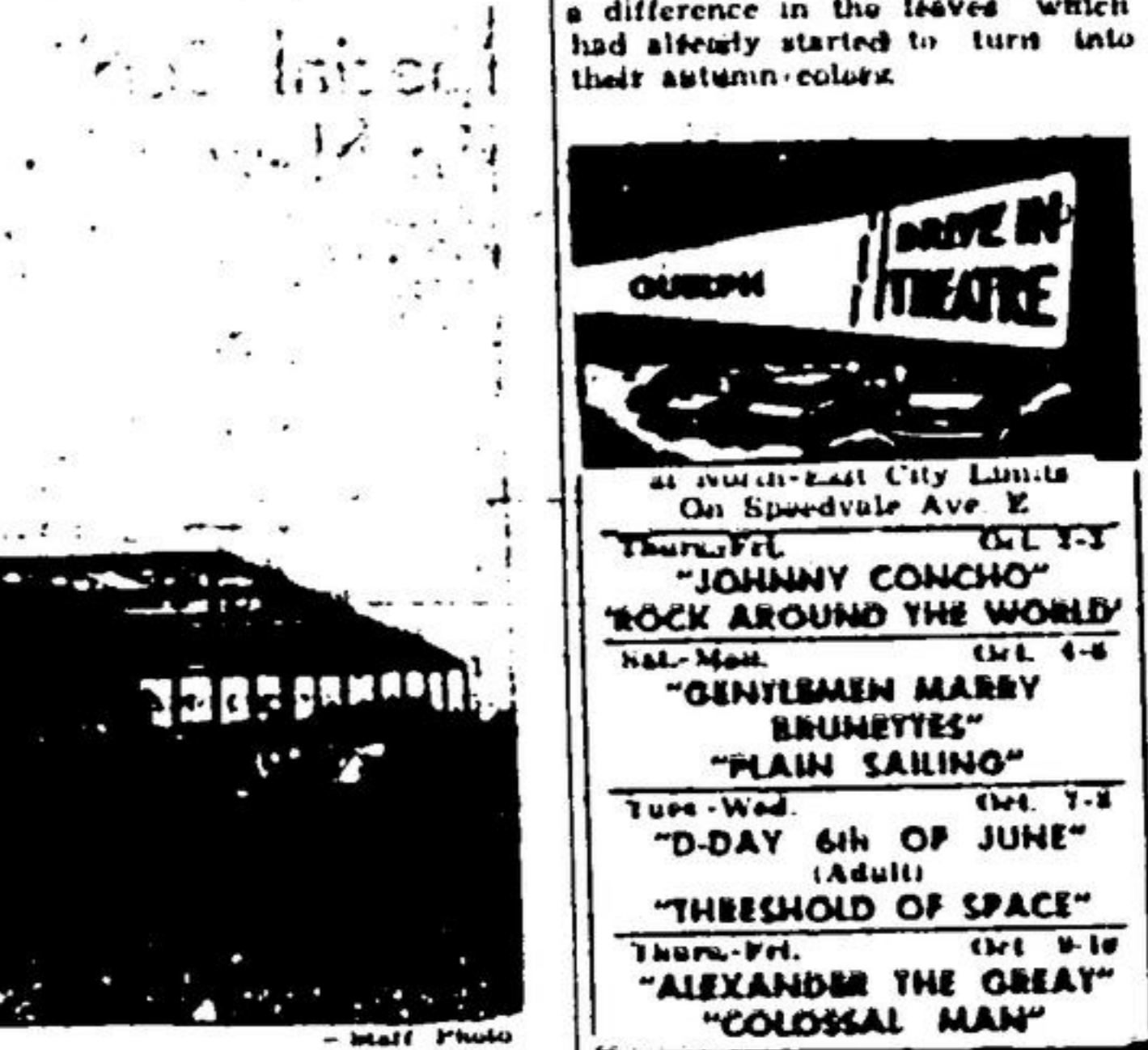
Mr. and Mrs. Mike Norton have bought Mr. Bert Rodgers property and are moving in. All welcome Mr. and Mrs. Norton to the community.
