IMMIGRANTS INCREASE

The building of the CPR that opened up the west just before the turn of the century and the aggressive immigration policy that shortly thereafter brought to the area and to the whole country, new Canadians on a scale never equalled before or since, added in bringing unprecedented prosperity and progress to the country. In the 1901-11 decade, Saskatchewan's population increased by 400,000, a number equal to almost half of the province's total population.

Canada ranking seventh in the world in the production of steel, has had in the period since just prior to World War II the greatest proportionate increases in steel production capacity of any of the world's major steel producers. At January 1, 1958, Canada's steel furnaces had a rated input capacity of 5,944,000 net tons per annum, an increase of 76 per cent. over one year earlier and of 631 per cent. over six years earlier.
