Friday, October 10th, was not only a bad day weather-wise but also for the home team.

In the first five minutes of the first quarter, Ross Shortall took the ball over for the home team, but downed it. After the unsuccessful conversion attempt, the score stood Acton 6 - Milton 0. Later, as the home boys held the Milton crew backed up to their own goal line, the Milton boys were forced to kick and they did not. Bill Brush, who was on side when the ball was kicked, streaked down the field and recovered the ball.

With a lucky bounce which put the ball into his arms, he went the rest of the way for a touchdown. Glenn Wilson took the next one over for the third tally to end the scoring for the first quarter. The score stood at 12 to 0 for Milton.

In the second quarter, the Acton boys held the Milton team to one touchdown. That one was taken across the line by Glenn Wilson. At the end of the first half, the score was Milton 12 and Acton 0.

In the third quarter, after a rest, Milton was again in good scoring form. Brush caught a long pass and he ran the other over, netting two touchdowns for the Milton squad. Also, Brush and McCutcheon pointed the ball into the end zone for single points, which brought the score to 24 for Milton and 0 for Acton. This ended the scoring.

In the fourth quarter, the two teams held each other to a stalemate. So there you have another

game played by the Acton Red Devils.

Acton lost to Georgetown on Tuesday by a score of 7 to 3 in the first quarter. There was a stalemate. Another team could move the ball far enough for a touchdown.

In the second quarter, neither team could move the ball very far. In the third quarter, Acton had driven close enough to the backer, Jim Frank, kicked a beautifully placed kick into the left corner over the goal line but the ball rolled out of bounds for the single point.

Again in the fourth quarter, Acton tried for a plunge over the line but the Georgetown defense held and took over possession of the ball on their own yard line. When they tried an end run, John Brown, right corner linebacker, streaked through and tackled the ball carrier behind Georgetown's goal line, which gave Acton their final score of the game. Acton got two points for that tackle, which made the score 3-0 for Acton.

In the third quarter, nothing much happened. Dale Woodburn almost intercepted a pass but dropped it off the end of his fingers. In the last quarter, Georgetown was forced to turn to passing. By many lucky catches, they moved the ball down the field. Jim Frank almost intercepted a pass but it got away from him. When Acton finally took over the ball on their own three yard line, they started to move, until late in the quarter the ball was fumbled by D. J. Woodburn and Georgetown took over.

By penalties and lucky catches they marched the ball down to the Acton goal line where on third down, with 25 seconds to go, they tried a plunge and it failed and just barely made it. The conversion attempt was successful and that ended the scoring with Georgetown 7 and Acton 3. There was only enough time to kick off and when they did the game was over. The final score stood at 7-3 for Georgetown.

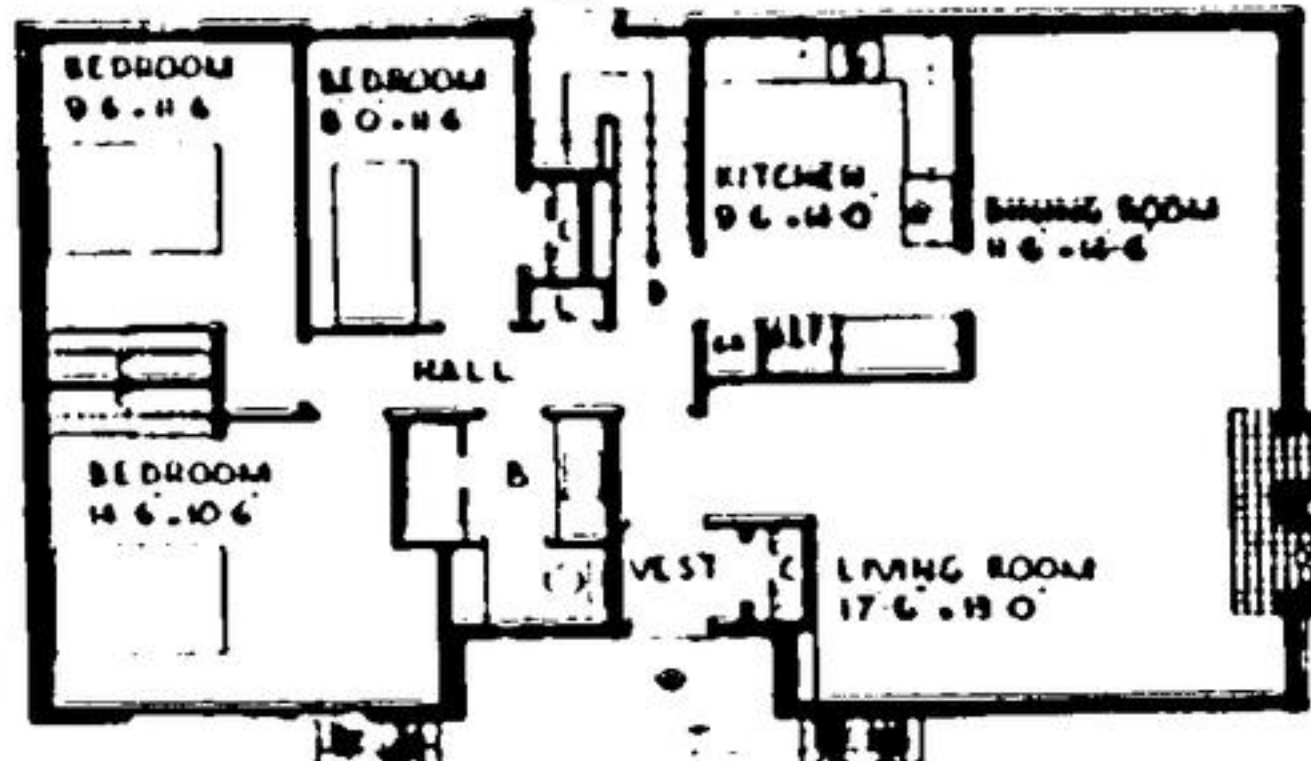
Attractive Bungalow Shows Careful Planning and Design



The substantial appearance of this three-bedroom bungalow designed by architect P. Mey, chief of Toronto, should find appeal with many prospective home owners. The massive chimney, wide windows and attractive entrance, highlighted by two planting areas, all contribute to a pleasing exterior.

The architect has given the same careful attention to the interior design providing for well separated living and sleeping quarters. The well planned kitchen has ample cupboard space and is convenient to both the dining room and rear service entrance. The separate compartments in the bathroom is another feature.

The floor area is 1,391 square feet and the exterior dimensions are 48 feet by 29 feet. Working drawings for this house, known as Design 236, are available from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation at minimum cost.

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Hornby Woman Dies on Monday In Car Accident

Milton and Hornby district friends were saddened to learn of the sudden death Monday afternoon of Mrs. F. Foster Bram of R.R. 2, Hornby, a resident active in many community affairs.

Mrs. Bram was killed and her husband hospitalized when a car in collision with a dump truck at a rural intersection 15 miles north of Brampton. Mr. Bram, 71, is in Dufferin Area Hospital suffering a broken right leg and fractured left foot.

Nephew Hurt Also

A nephew of the Hornby couple, 23-year-old Henry Foster Noble of Caledon East, who was driving the car, is also hospitalized, with concussion and head lacerations.

Port Credit district O.P.P. said the Foster vehicle was eastbound on the Five Sideroad when the car was struck by the northbound truck entering the intersection from the Third Line of Caledon Township. The car was thrown into the ditch and Lawson Montgomery, 21, of Mallon, driver of the truck, was pinned beneath the car.

A nearby resident and passer-by tried the car off Montgomery with a car jack and extra rail. He received crushed muscles in both legs, cuts and abrasions, police reported.

Funeral services for Mrs. Bram is being held this afternoon (Thursday) at St. Stephen's church, Hornby, where she was a member. Interment will be in the adjoining cemetery.

Mrs. Bram is survived by her husband, sister Mrs. B. F. Green, Evelyn of St. Helen's, Ont., and brother Wesley of Toronto.
