## Install \$8,000 Machine To Tabulate Hydro Bills

Installation of a new \$8,000 bill-tabulating machine in the town office was completed this week to handle the four-block rate hydro billing. The new machine, equipped to tabulate hydro bills 100% mechanically, the newer piece of equipment can be adapted to handle all tabulating and tabulating such as tax bills, payroll sheets and hydro bills reported the town clerk.

Installation of the new machine was made necessary with the adoption of the four-block rate system since the older machine could only tabulate two rates.

Replacing an older machine which only covered 75% of the work mechanically, the newer piece of equipment can be adapted to handle all tabulating and tabulating such as tax bills, payroll sheets and hydro bills reported the town clerk.

## R. N. Brown Subdivision Said Premature

"No person shall erect residential houses unless services are there," informed Mr. Deacon that Mr. Brown sought someone and have the entire area to planning board members Tuesday evening by planning consultant P. Alan Deacon.

The directive followed a discussion regarding a recent request by R. N. Brown area resident to have the town of Acton install sewer services on his property on Churchill Road.

Mr. Deacon was informed that Mr. Brown had submitted a plan of subdivision some time ago for the area and after installation of the water line to the new well site on Churchill Road north he had requested installation of a sewer line.

The planning consultant advised sewer services were necessary in the area for any other purpose and Mayor W. H. Cook replied they were not.

Mr. Deacon added the board members do not like to know how many services there were in Acton before he made any immediate decision.

When told Mr. Brown had referred to services being supplied to the Pentecostal church, Mr. Whitman explained what had transpired in reference to the installing the services. Mr. Deacon concluded from this that irrespective of what happened in the past there was no zoning by law to ignore.

According to the zoning by law council, it is their duty with an application to build in an R-2 zone unless the services have been installed, remarked Mr. Deacon.

**Committee of Adjustment**

When informed about the newly appointed committee of adjustment to deal with the zoning by law, Mr. Deacon enquired if any of the members had previous experience in the area prior to being appointed to the zoning by law.

The consultant responded that while the committee of adjustment

was not the zoning by law committee, the members were responsible for issuing permits and assessing applications in accordance with the zoning by law.

Mr. Deacon informed the council that if any doubt should arise in the minds of the committee, advice should be sought from the Planning Board.

In closing the planning council remanded it as a task to the committee.

**Plan Premature**

When asked if 2008 was available in the town, he said that it indicated a possible four-year growth based on past growth in town and predicted any further application for a plan of subdivision in the area planned out by Mr. Brown would be premature.

Mr. Deacon informed the town council that the zoning by law committee had been given an opportunity to review the plan of subdivision and to make any recommendations.

It goes to work in over 100 countries. One UNICEF dollar buys enough powdered milk to give 10 hungry children a large glass of milk every day for a week. Five dollars buys enough medicine to cure 17 children of trachoma an eye disease that ends in blindness.

Ten dollars will pay for the medicine to treat 200 children for leprosy a tropical disease. And \$50 will treat 50 children of their parents for leprosy.

UNICEF funds also protect little ones against tuberculosis. Teachers mothers how to care for their children builds homes for orphans and training schools for child nurses.

UNICEF will make good use of every penny.
